Mrs. Cadwalader came to Kalispell in 1900 with Mr. Cadwalader and two sons, Gordon and Floyd. A year ago she went to Spokane for an operation for cancer and was apparently well for some time. Five months ago she was taken ill again and soon went to the hospital where she has been confined since.

A sister from the east arrived here a few days ago and was with her when death came. Of her immediate relatives, her sister, a son, Floyd, Mr. Cadwalader, and a brother, Jerry Belles, are here.

MONTANA PIONEER TAKEN BY DEATH

H. A. D'ACHEUL, A PROMINENT EARLY SETTLER, DIES IN PASADENA, CALIF.

H. A. D'Acheul, aged 71 years and one of the early settlers of Butte, died yesterday at Pasadena, Cal., according to word received by Harry Wallace, clerk of the federal court, and nephew of the aged pioneer. The message did not convey any details of his death nor tell of the funeral arrangements, but Mr. Walker believes that the man was ill only a short time. In the pioneer days Mr. D'Acheul was a great booster Butte and at that time he was familiar figure in the treasure state. He owned considerable property in this city and among other possessions he had the building on Main street, occupied by Leys jewelry store, the D'Acheul block at 26 West Broadway and the D'Acheul building at 104 East Park street. Until a few years ago he made Butte his home but after retiring from active business moved to Pasadena to spend his declining years. He is survived. by his wife, two sisters, Mrs. L. A. Walker of Butte, and Mrs. H. M. Parchen of Helena. The many friends of Mr. D'Acheul in Montana will be greatly grieved to hear of his death.

Mr. D'Acheul came to Montana from Missouri in 1868. He located in Helena and was there married in 1873 to Miss Hattie Rumley of Helena. He was employed by the Parchen & Paynter Drug company for a number of years and moved from Helena to Deer Lodge to take the management of a branch house established by this firm at Deer Lodge. From Deer Lodge he came a few. years later to Butte and with Parchen organized a drug company which conducted a healthy business from the start. The firm of Parchen & Paynter was dissolved and Parchen married a sister of Mr. D'Acheul, which led to the organization of the new firm.

At the time of his retirement from business Mr. D'Acheul was rated as very wealthy and he elected to enjoy the last years of his life on the Pacific coast where the climate was more agreeable to his health.

Mr. D'Acheul was a member of no fraternal organizations but enjoyed the confidence and respect of everyone who knew him. He had neither business nor personal enemies and the news of his death brings only sorrow and regret. No news has been received of the funeral arrangements.—Butte Miner.
