Sidney Collins, who has been a resident of Kalispell for some time, died yesterday at the Sisters' hospital of cancer of the stomach, from which he has been suffering for some time. He was 57 years of age and has followed the occupation of a lumberman. Interment will be made in Demersville cemetery.

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The funeral of Anna Josephine, the little daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Danielson, who died yesterday, will be held Friday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from the Norwegian Lutheran church.

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Funeral services were held in the Columbia Falls Catholic church yesterday for the late Mrs. Christiana Dellasara, and her remains were placed in the Catholic cemetery there. Mrs. Dellasara died very suddenly of heart disease Monday. She was granted a decree of divorce about a week ago and was preparing to leave Columbia Falls. Shortly after attempting to handle a heavy trunk she threw up her hands, said "good-bye" and fell dead. She leaves no children.

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**FUNERAL OF MRS. EVANS.**

This morning at 11 o'clock the body of Mary Rachel Long Evans was laid at rest in the Conrad Memorial cemetery. The presence of a very large number of people spoke the sympathy and sorrow of an entire community. Rev. J. W. **MRS. HENRY GOOD.**

The sad news of the death of Mrs. Henry Good which reached Kalispell yesterday came as a distinct shock not only to the people of this city but also of the entire family, as but few were aware that she was seriously ill.

Mrs. Good first contracted influenza, which turned into pneumonia from which she had nearly recovered when she suffered a paralytic stroke, which in her weakened condition she was unable to withstand. The end came at 12:15 Sunday morning.

Mrs. Good, whose maiden name was Melissa Ada Bowdish, was born in Nashville, Tennessee, October 21, 1876. She came to the Flathead with her family in 1889, and was married to Mr. Good on December 28 of the same year. Two children were born to them, Mark Henry Good who is 17 years of age and Ruth Ada, aged 13. Beside her husband and children Mrs. Good is survived by her mother, Mrs. Melissa J. Bowdish, and her four brothers, William J., Charles, John D. and Harry F. Bowdish. She was a member of the Eastern Star lodge at Columbia Falls and of the Maccabees lodge of Kalispell.

Although her chief interest was in her family and home, Mrs. Good was well known in this county, especially in the northern part, and from all are heard expressions of the deepest sorrow at her untimely end.

The funeral will be held from the Waggener chapel at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Geo. McVer Fisher officiating.

## NONPARTISAN LEAGUE ORGANIZER IS DEAD

E. A. Meyer, organizer for the nonpartisan league in this section, died at Fargo, N. D., of a complication of German measles and pneumonia, on Thursday last. This information was contained in a telegram to J. D. Munter from Mrs. Meyers, who did not arrive in Fargo until Friday morning, after her husband had passed away. The telegram states that the funeral was held Monday.

The following account is contained in a Fargo paper:

"Ernest A. Meyer died suddenly at the home of his brother-in-law, F. B. Van Hook, 904 Twelfth street north, Thursday morning. His wife and two children, age six and two years, arrived from their home at Kalispell, Mont., last week not knowing that the husband and father had passed away.

"Mr. Meyer, who had been one of the pioneer workers for the nonpartisan league was a resident of North Dakota until about a year ago. He was among the first organizers to engage in league work, remaining in this state till after the campaign the fall of 1916, since when he has been organizing and speaking in Montana.

"He arrived in Fargo Sunday morning and complained of feeling ill. It developed that he had German measles and his condition was not thought to be serious. Pneumonia set in and about midnight Thursday a hurried call was sent his physician, but his heart was so weak that nothing could be done to save him.

"Mr. Meyer was en route to Minnesota where he intended working for the league for the next few months. His mother arrived from the old family home at De Lamere, N. D., in time to be recognized by her son. Deceased was 39 years of age."

The family have lived in Kalispell for a number of months, and resided at 229 Eighth street west.

Funeral services for little John Minicken will be held tomorrow morning at 10:30 from the chapel of the Sherman undertaking rooms. Father O'Farrell will have charge of the services. Burial will be made in the Conrad Memorial cemetery.

The body of William Mowatt, who died at the county hospital December 5, will be shipped to Devon for burial on train 2 tonight, by his son, who arrived in the city last evening. It is said that he has two other sons who were in this section a short time ago, but have left and cannot be located. There are also several daughters living in the eastern part of the state.

### ARTHUR PENNEY.

The body of Arthur Penney of Butte arrived in Kalispell this morning. Deceased was a brother of Walter Penney of Demersville He was 34 years of age. Death was caused by Spanish influenza. Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock today in the Conrad Memorial cemetery.

### MRS. ERNEST REUSS.

Mrs. Ernest Reuss of Whitefish died yesterday of pneumonia which followed an attack of influenza. Her husband, who is a fireman on the Great Northern, is also ill, and at the emergency hospital at the Masonic temple, but it is understood that he is improving.

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William Russell, familiarly known to everyone as Shorty Russell, died Thursday afternoon at the emergency hospital in Whitefish, having been sick with influenza only this week. Pneumonia developed rapidly and the end came soon. He had worked around town as a painter for some time, but lately has been track-walker at Vista for the Great Northern. Nothing is known of any relatives, but he had told friends that he was an orphan and had been brought up in a minister's family. He also told of having been a jockey for years and riding on the famous race tracks in the east and south. Since coming here, he had lived alone, but was always cheerful and friendly to all he met.

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#### TRUSCOTT THOMAS FUNERAL TO BE SUNDAY AFTERNOON

The funeral of Truscott Thomas, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Thomas, who died of influenza yesterday morning, will be held from the Waggener chapel at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Services will be conducted at the grave.

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#### DARRELL WALKER FUNERAL

The funeral of the late Darrell Walker, who died at Spokane yesterday, will take place from the Sherman chapel on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock. Services will be held at the cemetery. Cars will be provided for friends wishing to attend.

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#### MRS. MABEL WISE.

Mrs. Mabel Wise, wife of Charles C. Wise of Belton, died of pneumonia at the Sisters' hospital last night. The death is a particularly sad one, as her baby daughter died but a few days ago following an operation to remove a button which she had swallowed. No funeral arrangements have yet been made.

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#### MRS. AGATHA SCHENDEL.

The death of Mrs. Agatha Schendel occurred at 1 o'clock this morning at her home in this city after an illness of several days with influenza. Beside her husband, W. A. Schendel she is survived by two small children. Mrs. Schendel was a niece of the late Thomas Clifford, and was well known here. The funeral will be held Saturday, but the hour has not yet been set.

## MRS. STANNARD PASSED AWAY

Mrs. George F. Stannard died at eight o'clock last night at her home in this city, after months of patient suffering from cancer.

Although she has been very ill for a long time and her death was not unexpected, yet the news of her death was a shock to the entire community and the grief of the members of her family will be shared by hundreds of friends who loved Mrs. Stannard because of her sunny, cheerful disposition at all times, and her sterling character.

Mrs. Stannard who, before her marriage to George F. Stannard, on July 20, 1910, was Miss Jennie Swaney. She is survived by her husband, three brothers, Andrew, James and Lawrence Swaney, and two sisters, Mrs. George McVey Fisher of Kallspeil and Mrs. A. D. Macdonlad of Galen, Montana.

Mrs. Stannard was one of the pioneers of the Flathead valley. She came with her parents to Missoula in 1882, and in 1890 moved to the Flathead, where she has resided for nearly 30 years.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock from the home, 245 Fifth avenue east. The services will be conducted by Rev. L. L. Totten of the Presbyterian church.
