KOOTENAI MOURN DEATH OF ANTISTE

Polson, June 30.—Funeral services for Thomas Antiste, sub-chief of the Kootenai Indians, who died last week at Polson, were held Saturday at this city, and were featured by an address to the mourners by his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Joe Antiste, in the Kootenai tongue. The address was then translated by Father O'Malley, who conducted the service.

Antiste held office by virtue of the appointment of a former chieftain. He had made numerous trips to the national capital in the interest of tribal affairs. He was about 65 years old. Death was due to pneumonia.

In her address Mrs. Antiste told the assembled Indians and whites that if the chief could speak, he would tell them to attend church regularly, not to fish or dance or play cards on Sunday, never to steal or gamble, but to be truthful and honest, and never to use intoxicants. The life of the chieftain was an exemplary one, and he followed the maxims which his daughter-in-law spoke of.

A message was received here this morning telling of the death of Alice Best, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Best, former residents of Kalispell. They are now living at San Diego. No details were contained in the message.

Helen Louise, the little two-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Betz, passed away at the family home in Deer Park February 7, after a short illness of influenza. All that loving hands could do was done, but the little one was not strong enough to get over such a struggle. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon, interment being made in the cemetery at Columbia Falls. Mr. and Mrs. Betz have the sympathy of the entire community.

A dispatch from Walla Walla says this was the second death this week on account of bad roads. Woo Chung, a Chinese cook, was jolted off a car Sunday and killed.

**FUNERAL IS HELD
FOR HAMILTON LEE**

Funeral services for Hamilton Lee were conducted in the Masonic temple at 10 o'clock this morning, in the presence of a large gathering of friends. Many beautiful floral offerings further testified to the esteem in which Mr. Lee was held in the community.

The Masonic services were held in the temple and at the grave in Conrad Memorial cemetery, as Mr. Lee had requested. He had been active in the fraternity for many years and was the first master of the lodge at Malta.

Rev. L. L. Totten, of the Presbyterian church, preached a consoling sermon in the temple. Rev. O. D. Harris, of the Christian church, assisted in the services there and at the cemetery. A quartet composed of Mrs. C. J. McAllister, Mrs. O. A. Colby, A. P. Bruce and Andrew Dunshire, sang, accompanied by Mrs. Harry Taylor.

The pallbearers were Ward Lyman, E. C. Knight, J. E. Erickson, W. P. McMannamy, F. O. Williams and A. S. Bland.

Hamilton Lee was born in Utica, Ohio, October 25, 1853, and moved with his parents to Madison county, Iowa, when he was nine years old. On January 1, 1873, he was married to Martha J. Robinson, who survives him, with their five children, Miss Laura Lee, Mrs. C. A. Ross, Edgar and Roy, all of whom live in Dodson, and Nellie Mercedes, who, with Mrs. Lee were in Los Angeles with Mr. Lee when he died, May 2.

Mr. Lee moved his family to Dodson in 1901, and four years later came to KallsPELL, his sons continuing on the ranch at Dodson, while he spent his time between KallsPELL and there. He was elected to the city council here and also to the local school board.

Mrs. Lee and the others of the family plan to leave this evening for Dodson.

JOLTED FROM AUTO INFANT IS KILLED

Howard, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Reid, of Kalispell, was killed Wednesday near Walla Walla, Wash., by being thrown from their automobile onto a pile of rocks at the side of the road. The child's skull was fractured.

The Reid family was on their way to Portland, traveling in a Ford. Between Dixie, Wash., and Walla Walla, their car skidded on the loose surface of the road and evidently hit a rut. One of the front wheels was torn off and the baby was hurled from its

mother's lap onto rocks at the roadside.

Besides Mr. and Mrs. Reid there were seven children and camping equipment in the car.

Interment was in the Conrad Memorial cemetery under the direction of Waggener and Sons.

OBITUARY.

Mabel Minnie Gibson was born in Weiröze, Nemaha county, Kan., September 8, 1893. She moved with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Gibson, to Kalispell in November, 1901, where she has since made her home. She was married to Daniel P. Tetrault January 7, 1914, they making their home at the Tetrault ranch ten miles north of Kalispell. To this union were born a boy, Paul Edison, on January 11, 1915, and a girl, Josephine Mabel, on December 25, 1918.

She was a member of the La Salle, W. C. T. U. and the Red Cross, in which organizations she took an active part; and was earnest and faithful in doing "her bit" in Red Cross work for our boys "over there."

She passed away January 18th, after an illness of several days of influenza, followed by pneumonia, and twenty-four hours previous to her death the infant daughter passed away of influenza.

She leaves to mourn her loss her husband and son Paul, mother, father, one brother and one sister and a host of sorrowing friends.

She was laid to rest with the infant daughter in her arms at the Central Memorial cemetery.

INFLUENZA TAKES ENTIRE FAMILY

With the death of his little son, Paul, aged four years, who expired this morning while on the road to the hospital for treatment, the entire family of D. P. Tetrault has been wiped out by the influenza in just eight days.

The baby daughter, less than a month old died on January 17, and the mother died the following day, their double funeral being held on January 22. Little Paul was very sick at the time, and this morning Mr. Tetrault decided to bring him from his home, north of the city, to the Sisters' hospital for treatment, but the little fellow died when they reached the bridge near the Northwestern dam on the Whitefish road.

The body was brought in to the Sherman undertaking establishment, and the funeral will be held at the Sherman parlors Monday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. Father O'Farrell officiating.

Miss Mary Mitchell, who has been assisting the family during their illness has been very ill with the disease, but it is reported today that she is much improved.
