BODY OF WAR HERO ARRIVES HERE TODAY

The body of Private Jerry H. Sullivan, who died in the German prison hospital at Trier, October 30, 1918, arrived in Kalispell this morning in charge of Private Engle of Fort Sheridan, Wyoming, who was detailed for the duty by military authorities there.

Private Sullivan left here with his detachment on July 1, 1918, and after a few weeks in the training camp at Fort Dodge, was sent to the front. While in the fighting in Argonne he was captured on October 4, and taken to the military prison at Trier, where he contracted pneumonia from which he died on October 20. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Morty Sullivan, of Creston were notified of his death on December 21, and his body is the first of the world war heroes to be returned home for burial.

Funeral services will be held at St. Matthews church Monday, Oct. 15, at 11 o'clock. It will be attended by the American Legion, which will escort the body to Conrad Memorial Cemetery, where it will be given a military burial.
