## LIBBY MINER KILLED BY FALLING ROCK

Libby, Aug. 2.—While working at the Lukens-Hazel mine, testing for loose rock on the side and top of the drift, on which a crew were working, a rock weighing 1,600 pounds, fell from the top crushing Marshall N. Brooks to the ground, and caused his death six hours later. The left side of his body was badly crushed. Deceased was 44 years old and for some time has been head miner at the Lukens-Hazel. Funeral services were held at the Methodist church on Thursday afternoon.

## DIES OF WOUNDS

A peculiar circumstance of the shooting at Libby last Monday in which Marshall Fred Bockman was killed, is that his assailant is unknown, and the man, who is now dead, although informed that he could not live, refused to give his name, or to say where he was from, according to James McLaren, who was in Libby yesterday. All that is known of him is that he had been in Libby for about a month, and had worked a short time at the plant of the Neils Lumber company, and evidently went into the bootlegging business afterward, as liquor was found on his person at the time of the shooting, and his cache of liquor was afterward discovered near the fair grounds.

Mr. McLaren states that feeling ran very high in Libby, and there is a possibility that had he not died there would have been a lynching. The man did not commit suicide, as was reported in Kalispell by R. E. Herrick, but in the gun fight with Marshall Bockman was wounded in the throat and died of his injuries the following day. The only witness to the tragedy was Warren Hill whose call for help precipitated the shooting.

The funeral of Mr. Bockman is being held today, and all business in Libby is suspended for the day. He leaves a wife and three small children.
