2 WARLAND BABES BURNED TO DEATH

Libby, Oct. 29.—Iver, two years and Ben, 13 months, two baby boys of Mr. and Mrs. James Evans of Warland, were burned to death Monday in a fire that destroyed the Evans home. Mrs. Evans went to the store at 2:30, leaving the baby in bed and Iver playing in the yard. She was gone about five minutes when the fire whistle blew. Fire advanced so rapidly that it was impossible to rescue the babies. Iver had gone to the house after his mother left. After the fire the body of Iver was found on the bed and the baby's body was found in the kitchen, both badly charred. There had been no fire in the house for several hours and it is thought that fire was smoldering about the chimney and broke out. Mrs. Evans left for the store. Mr. Evans is an employe of the Bair Harper Lumber company at Warland.
