PAY LAST TRIBUTE TO WALTER H. GRIFFIN

The vast number of friends who gathered at the Elks' temple yesterday afternoon to pay tribute to the memory of Walter H. Griffin spoke eloquently of the high regard in which he was held in the community in which he has lived for the past this three years. To everyone he came in contact with he was always a friend, ever cheerrur and ready to give of his time and substance to any, worthy chairty or enterprise.

Long before the hour of the funeral the lodge room of the temple was filled to capacity, and many were unable to find seats.

The eulogy was pronounced by George H. Grubb, past exalted ruler of the order, and close personal friend of the deceased since the early days of Kalispell. Mr. Grubb spoke of the many excellent qualities of Mr. Griffin and followed this by a brief sketch of his life.

Mr. Griffin, the speaker said, was born at Brantford, Ontario, October 31, 1850. He received his early education in Brantford, and while a young man entered the employ of the Dominion Telegraph company. In May 1881 he left Brantford and removed to Barnsville, Minnesota, where he entered the employ of the Great Northern Railway company as chief clerk to the division superintendent. While in that city he served as city recorder. president of the council of Barnsville, two years as president of the board of education, and he also served as mayor of the city. In May, 1891, he came to Kalispell, where he has since made his home. Here he served three successive terms as mayor, and one term as chairman of the board of county commissioners of Flathead county.

The invocation and benediction were pronounced by Rev. Clarence Kopp of the Episcopal church.

Burial was made in Conrad Memorial cemetery under the impressive ritualistic ceremony of the Elks' lodge.

During these years of service he exemplified in conduct and spirit the beautiful lessons and principals of a true Odd Fellow. His devotion and loyalty to our order will remain an abiding influence and benediction.

The following quotation seems fitting as a concluding tribute to his character and disposition, which was to "View their stature and their qualities, and select their actions all that is noblest and worthiest to know."

TO WALTER H. GRIFFIN

At the funeral services for the late Walter H. Griffin a letter from Dr. G. A. Fuson, formerly of Kalispell, was read. So many requests have been made for copies of the letter that it has been decided to print an étract from it, so that all who wished copies might see that part which made the letter valuable to friends of Mr. Griffin. The extract reads as follows:

"I don't know how we are going to get along without Walter Griffin, He always seemed as fixed and dependable as the mountains that encircled the little valley in which he lived. In a subtier sense he was a pioneer, and led the van in all important movements looking to the betterment of Kalispell and the surrounding country. To these he gave the best that was in him, and he who writes the biography of Walter Griffin will. whether consciously or not, also write much of the history of the beautiful valley to wnose people he dedicated a life of service. He was one of nature's noblemen-a polished gentleman who never learned how to be rude. With a lavish Mand, he scattered seeds of friendship until his friends could scarcely be counted because of their number.

"Somehow, I've never thought of just what it would mean if Walter Griffin was not among the living. And even now, I don't quite understand that he is dead. But such is the manner of Fate that she often strikes without warning, and, it seems, without choosing, and the best and most useful are often victims of her poisoned shafts. I like to think of him as human. Whether attractive or repellant, he understood, alike, the emotions that sway mankind and, if he could know our thoughts today, his great soul would share the grief with which our own are weighted to the earth.

"Walter Griffin was my friend and yours. We're going to miss him more than we can tell. But his devotion as a friend—his good words and generaus deeds can never be forgotten by those of us who know him."
