CLYDE KEELING DIES SUDDENLY

The death of Glyde Keeling, which occurred at the Sister's hospital at 1 o'clock this afternoon, came as a great shock not only to his relatives, but to the entire community.

Mr. Keeling, who had been suffering with appendicitis for several months, submitted to an operation Monday. Although it was a very complicated one, the operation was successfully performed and he was believed to be making satisfactory progress until about 10 o'clock this morning, when he began to sink rapidly.

Mr. Keeling, who was a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Keeling of Somers, and has lived all his life in this community, where he has always been held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He was a veteran of the world war, and an officer of the local branch of the American Legion in the affairs of which he has always taken a most active part. At the time of his death he occupied the position of deputy clerk of the district court, which he has held for the past two years.

Besides his wife and little son he is survived by his parents, a brother, Robert Keeling of Somers, and a sister, Mrs. Roy Seal of Eureka.

The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

The funeral services for Clyde Keeling were held at the Epworth M. E. church on Sunday at 2 o'clock, Reverend Walter B. Spaulding officiating. The music was furnished by the male quartet from Somers. Large delegations were present from the American Legion, the Owls, and the Masonic lodge. The Boy Scouts of troop one were of in full force to pay their tribute to their scoutmaster, whom they had learned to love and respect. The church was packed until there was no longer standing room either in the aisles or in the balconies or doorways. Many were unable to get in at all. The funeral was one of the largest held i in Kalispell for many years.

Clyde Keeling was born at Fredonia, Kansas, May 22, 1897, and died at Kalispell, Montana, January 24, 1924, aged twenty-six years, eight months, and two days. He came to Columbia Falls with his parents, brother and sister, May 1, 1908, where he resided for a few years, moving from there with his family to the state of Idaho, and back to Somers in the year 1912. He graduated from the Flathead county high school in 1917, after which he went to Washington, D. C., being employed in the Civil Service department, and while there he enlisted as a volunteer in the United States navy, serving his country until his discharge from the service the following April. 1919. He returned to his home at Somers, and on the 24th day of June, 1919, he was united in marriage to Ida Gilbertson, of Kalispell. With her he returned to Washington, D. C., to resume his work in the Civil Service department, returning to harispell with his family in April, 1521, where he has since resided. He was employed as deputy clerk of court of Flathead county during the past two years, and was so employed at the time of his death. He had united with the Methodist church at Somers, and transferred his membership to Kalispell. While he was in Somers he acted as president of the Epworth League for about two years, and was active in church work ...

Clyde was also actively identified with the Boy Scouts of Kalispell, having filled the position of Scout-master the past year. He was affiliated fraternally with Kalispell lodge No. 42, A. F. & A. M., the order of Owls, Woodmen of the World, and the American Legion, at Kalispell and was adjutant of the post at the

time of his death.

Besides his wife, he leaves to mourn his loss, one son, Robert, age about three years, his father, mother and brother Robert, residing at Somers, and one sister, Mrs. Roy Seal of Eureka. Montana.
