ANGUS McDONALD DEAD

Angus P. McDonald, well-known pioneer stockman of the reservation country, died at the Polson hospital last Wednesday, and was buried Saturday.

The senior Angus, father of the deceased, was one of the first white men in this region, coming here with the Thompson expedition which explored the Clark's Fork country over 80 years ago. He was a man of fine education, considered one of the best-read men in western Montana.

The deceased, who was known as "Old" Angus or "Big" Angus to distinguished him from a half-brother also named Angus, was a man of very emotional temperment, although of rugged physique. He was an inveterate reader, his knowledge of history, especially Scotch history being quite astonishing, considering his opportunities and environment. He was always hospitable at his Little Bitter Root ranch, friends and strangers being welcome alike.

It is believed that his mother was an Iroquois Indian woman and that he is survived by a brother Duncan and a half-brother Angus, and by some neices and nephews. He is ally so survived by a wife and three children

OBITUARY OF MELVIN BAMFORD MENDENHALL

WHITEFISH STUDENT DROWNED IN RIVER

Marion Morrison, Aged Nineteen, Loses Life When Ice Breaks Under Skating Party.

Whitefish, Dec. 1.—While skating on the Whitefish river between Lupfer and O'Brien avenues last evening, Marion Morrison, aged 19, lost his life, and 10 other young people, all students of the Whitefish high school, narrowly escaped drowning when the ice broke and precipitated them into about 15 feet of water.

Those who were rescued owe their lives to Dean Cook, a Boy Scout and senior in the high school, Robert Edmonson, R. M. Van Slyke and the chief of police of Whitefish: Young Cook, who was an onlooker, stripped off his coat and plunged into the icy water and brought four to safety before he was exhausted and had to give up. Edmonson, assisted by Van Slyke and the chief of police, secured a rope which Mr. Edmonson keeps for emergencies of this kind, and worked until they had rescued all the others except the Morrison boy. It is probable he, too, would have been saved had not someone made the statement he had got out by himself and gone home. A short time after it was discovered that he was missing, when a boat was secured and his body recovered one hour after the accident. From 9 o'clock until midnight every effort was made to resusciate him, but life was extinct. The others were all badly chilled and some were unconscious when they were removed and taken to the Edmonson, Van Slyke and Holter homes nearby and revived.

During the afternoon more than 50 skaters were on the river and it was thought the ice was safe, but about 8 o'clock in the evening the party of students were playing crack-the-whip, and venteured too far out.

Those in the skating party were: Ruby and Pearl Harden, Erwin and Felicia Holter, Zelma Latcher, Gale Stocking, Dolly Parks, Zelma Hulder, Lorella Brittel and Marion Morrison.

The unfortunate boy, the only son of Mr. and Mrs. William Morrison, was held in the highest esteem by his fellow students and all who knew him, and the greatest sympathy is expressed for the bereaved parents. The father is a traveling engineer on the Kalispell division.
