# PIONEER RESERVATION WOMAN DIES AT RONAN

Ronan, July 3.—Mrs. Mary Kane Polson, wife of the late David Polson, for whom the town of Polson was named, died Monday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. C. Hitchcock, following an illness of nearly a year

Mrs. Polson was a member of the Nez Perces tribe and was born in Idaho, June 3, 1839. She was married to David Polson and in 1885 they came to the Flathead valley, settling at the foot of Flathead lake, on what is now the Governor Dixon ranch. When a postoffice was established in 1898, near this point, it was named Polson, for this pioneer family. After the death of her husband in 1902, Mrs. Polson continued to make her home on the Dixon ranch, even after it passed into the possession of Governor Dixon, living in a little cottage there until because of ill-health she could no longer live alone.
