## MRS. H. C. RUSK RECEIVES NEWS OF NEPHEW'S DEATH

A clipping from an Indiana paper received by Mrs. H. C. Rusk of this city, accords considerable honor to her nephew, Lieutenant George Gerald Rusk, who spent some time in Kalispell about ten years ago, and who was killed January 26, as an army aviator, at Brooks field, San Antonio, Texas.

Services for the popular flyer were held in the Christian church at Clark's Hill, according to the clipping, which describes the military funeral in part as follows:

"Many of the lieutenant's friends and those of the family came to do him posthumous honor. The sight of the flag-draped coffin and the strictly military air of the service made it highly impressive to the large throng which came for the services. The body, which had arrived in Clark's Hill Wednesday evening and had been taken to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James F. Rusk, was carried to the church shortly before the hour of the service."

The military atmosphere was enhanced by the presence of the regular army officers and many of Lieutenant Rusk's West Point classmates, and the service closed with a volley of shots over the grave and 'taps' sounded in the distance.
