WILLIAM WAMER BURIED 4 AT SOLDIERS HOME

Funeral services for William Wamer were held this morning at 10 o'clock at the Soldiers Home chapel by Rev. B. Scott Bates and interment was made in the Soldiers Home Cemetery under the direction of Waggener & Campbell.

Mr. Wamer was born in Ohio in 1838, served 4 years in the Civil war and came to Montana in the early days, settling near the present location of Great Falls, when he engaged in farming. Advancing in years he came to the Soldiers Home, where he died Sunday noon at the age of 86 years.

OBITUARY WILLIAM WAMER

William Wamer was born August 10th, 1838 in the State of Ohio. He enlisted in "F" Co. 2nd Regiment! Illinois Cavalry, August 30th 1861, and was discharged at New Iberry, La., December 10th, 1864.

He re-enlisted immediately in "H" Co. 2nd. Regiment Illinois Cavalry and was subsequently discharged at San Antonio Texas, in July 1865, having served his country for a period of 3 years, 10 months and 20 days.

He was married to Miss Zina See,

February 19, 1873, in Jasper County Missouri, later settling near Great Falls, Montana, in the year 1878.

He was admitted to the Montana Soldier's Home, December 13th 1916 from Cascade ounty, Mont., and died August 24th 1924, at 12:30 o'clock p. m. aged 86 years 14 days. He is survivied by his wife Mrs. Zina Wamer, and four daughters; Mrs. Carrie Soules of Seattle, Wn., Mrs. E. L. Brown of Choteau, Montana, Mrs. Lucy Sanborn of Kalispell, Montana and Mrs. Edua Adams of Choteau, Montana to mourn his loss.

Funeral services were held from the chapel at the soldiers home the G. A. R. ritual being followed. Rev. B. Scott Bates delivered the funeral sermon and, in the absence of a choir, comrades of the deceased joined in appropriate hyms.

The conclusion of the services at the cemetery were marked by the sounding of taps by a bugler.

He endeavored to place the belt on the moving pulley as had been the custom with him as well as the other employes at the plant. In doing this his body became engaged in the moving belt, was drawn around the pulley and thrown against the beams, crushing his skull.

His body was terribly bruised and broken and death was apparently instantateous.

Mr. Winegard was 34 years old and is survived by his wife, a bride of only a few months, who resides at the mill, and his father and mother at Cleveland, Ohio.
