**MRS. FLORENCE J. EGAN DEAD,  
FUNERAL TO BE HELD SUNDAY**

The death of Florence J. Egan occurred at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Duffy, one mile northeast of the city, last evening at 9 o'clock.

Florence J. Duffy was born September 22, 1891, at Missoula, Montana and came to Kalispell with her family that fall, where she grew to womanhood. She was married in 1909 to W. M. Egan and to this union four children were born, Winifred, Thomas, Donald and John.

Some little time ago she had the flu, from which she never fully recovered. About a year and a half ago tuberculosis set in and although everything possible was done for her she steadily faded and quietly and peacefully passed away. All through her long illness and suffering she never complained but bore it cheerfully.

Besides her children she is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Duffy, three sisters, Mrs. Margaret Bowdish of Kalispell, Mrs. Mary Allen of Portland, Oregon, and Anna Graham of LaCule, also six brothers, Gregory M., Raymond V., and James J. of Kalispell, Frank L. of Nirada, George W. of Whitefish and Alfred of Seattle.

The body is at the Sherman & Son undertaking parlors. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the Masonic temple with the Royal Neighbors and Lady Owls in charge, to which orders she belonged.
