CONDUCTED FOR MRS.
BERKHOLZ YESTERDAY**

Funeral services for Mrs. Amelia Berkholz were held yesterday afternoon at 2:30 at the German Lutheran church. Rev. A. Jordan paid high tribute to the life of Mrs. Berkholz and comforted the family with his sermon on a Christian's life and hopes. Three hymns were sung by the congregation. Burial was made in the Lutheran Church cemetery north of Kalispell under the direction of Waggener & Campbell.

Mrs. Amelia Berkholz was born in Germany, December 12, 1861. The family moved to Kalispell about 16 years ago, living here for 10 years, and making many friends. They then moved to Bend, Oregon, where Mrs. Berkholz passed away May 7, 1927, at the age of 65 years. She leaves to mourn her loss three children, Arthur Berkholz, Mrs. Kirks, and Mrs. Kasner, all of Bend, Oregon, and one sister, Mrs. Kelsow of Milk River, Alberta, Canada. Her husband, Julius Berkholz, died in 1900.

Mr. Bruyer came with his family to the Flathead valley in 1901, locating on a farm two miles north of Kalispell. He suffered with ill

health a year ago, and last November he made a trip to California, believing the change would benefit him. He returned to Kalispell and was here but one month when he passed away. Death came at the Sisters' hospital April 29. He was

73 years, 7 months and 11 days old at the time of his death.

Mr. Bruyer was a kind and loving husband and father and a staunch and loyal citizen, and his passing is a great loss to the community.
