Harriet A. Hardy was born May 7, 1845 at Watertown, New York. When a small child her parents moved to Tweed, Ontario, where she spent her girlhood days. At the age of 15 years, she was united in marriage to Robert Campbell. Two children, Adalaide and Willie were born to this union. At the age of 20 she was left a widow. In 1875 she was married to William Campbell (a brother of Robert). To this union were born seven children, six of whom are living.

She was a member of the Re-organized church of Jesus Christ of The Latter Day Saints, joining at Halfway, Michigan in 1897.

With her family she moved to Leduc, Alberta from there to Sweet Grass, Montana and a few years later to Coram where she had since resided.

She had been in poor health for some time and underwent an operation at the Sisters' hospital in Kalispell for ulcers of the stomach. The operation was performed Wednesday morning, February 9, and she died Monday night February 14, at the age of 72 years.

Those left to mourn her loss are her husband who is at Millet, Canada; a daughter, Mrs. Albert Emens, of Puritan, N. Y.; Mrs. Edward Pogue of Millet, Alberta; Roy Campbell of Edmonton, Canada, and Sidney, Frank and Willie Campbell and Mrs. A. Arneson of Coram. Two children Willie and Rosilla died in early childhood.

The funeral was conducted by the Order of Moose and was held at the Methodist church in Kalispell Friday afternoon, February 18, Rev. Chester officiating.

Many and beautiful were the floral offerings donated in memory of her loving kindness. Several of the lodges sent wreaths, besides the sprays and wreaths given by relatives and friends.

The pall bearers were Henry Bassford, Floyd Jones, Clare Johnston, Eli Burnett, Bruno and Otto Fehlberg. Interment was made in Conrad cemetery.

FUNERAL OF THOMAS CLEARY  
HELD IN SOMERS YESTERDAY

Funeral services for the late Thomas J. Cleary were held yesterday morning at 10 o'clock at the Catholic church at Somers. Requiem high mass was sung by Rev. Father Nolan. The pallbearers were James Manning, Mat Eccles, Robert Gatiss, Ed McGovern, J. H. McAfee, and R. L. Zeller. Interment was in the Conrad Memorial cemetery, under the direction of Sherman & Son.

Thomas Joseph Cleary was born in Arthur, Province of Ontario, Canada, February 2, 1857. In 1876 he came with other early pioneers to Philipsburgh, where he resided for 20 years, engaging in mining. August 1, 1891, at Deer Lodge, Montana, he was united in marriage to Miss Bridget O'Donnell, and to this union eight children were born. Mr. Cleary moved to Neihart, Montana, in 1896, where he continued his mining activities, until 1901 when he removed to the Flathead valley, engaging in farming in the lower valley.

Mr. Cleary was stricken with pneumonia last April, and never fully regained his former strength. He passed away at the Sisters' hospital June 21, aged 70 years, four months, and 19 days.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bridget Cleary; four daughters, Mrs. G. E. Nesbo, of Shelby, Mrs. William Ambrose of Creston, Mrs. Harold Foot, of Elmo, and Miss Frances Cleary of Kalispell; one sister, Mrs. Patrick Cassidy of Stepler, Alberta, Canada, and two brothers, William Cleary of Cadillac, Michigan, and Joseph Cleary of Phoenix, Arizona.
