

GEORGE HAAS PASSES AWAY

George Haas passed away yesterday afternoon at 4:15 o'clock at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. W. B. Alexander, 443 Second avenue east.

Mr. Haas was born in Jefferson, Wisconsin, where he resided the greater part of his life. He came to Priest River, Idaho in 1913 where he lived until 1925, when he removed to Lewiston, Idaho. He left the latter city a short time ago to visit his daughter here. He was 72 years of age, at the time of his death and had been able to follow his trade as a building contractor until about a year ago when his health failed.

Mr. Haas is survived by two daughters, Mrs. B. W. Alexander of Kalispell, and Mrs. C. A. Culliton of Superior, Wisconsin; two brothers and sisters, Heubert and Peter Haas, Mrs. Mary Wolfe, and Mrs. John Zimmerman all of Jefferson, Wisconsin, also ten grandchildren, William and Ruth Culliton of Kalispell, the other eight residing at Superior, Wisconsin; one great grandchild, Wilford James Culliton of Kalispell.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the Sherman and Son chapel. Rev. George McVey Fisher will officiate. Interment will be in Conrad Memorial cemetery.

SETTLER, PASSES AWAY**

George T. Hodgson, who has lived in the Flathead since 1886, passed away in the city last night.

Mr. Dodgson was born in River du Loup, Québec, Canada, December 17, 1850, coming to this section in the early days. He lived on a farm in the Lower Valley until 1917, when he sold his property and took up his residence in town.

He is survived by four sons, George T. Jr., of St. Ignatius; Charles of Spokane; and Leonard and W. H. Hodgson of Kalispell; and four daughters, Mrs. A. M. Hubbard of Troy; Mrs. C. S. Watson of Pocatello, Idaho; Mrs. W. A. Monroe of Everett, Washington; and Mrs. R. S. Borland of Lakeview, Oregon, all of whom are here for the funeral with the exception of Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Borland. Two brothers also survive.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the W. H. Hodgson home, 318 Third avenue east, Rev. G. M. Fisher officiating, and burial will be in Conrad Memorial cemetery.

Mr. Hodgson was married in 1887 to Mary M. Phillips and to them were born five children, all of whom are living, excepting a daughter, Mrs. Milton Hoidal, who passed away in 1922.

Those surviving are his widow; three daughters, Mrs. Joe Monegan of Whitefish; Mrs. H. O. Swisher of Columbia Falls and Miss Beth Hodgson who lives at home; and one son, Mark, of Kalispell. Two brothers, Laban and Charles and two sisters, Mrs. C. M. Phillips and Mrs. T. Pickett, all of Pleasantville, and a sister, Mrs. Van Pelt, of Highland, Ohio, also survive.

Mr. Hodgson united with the Christian church at Pleasantville, at the age of 18 years.

MANY PAY TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF MRS. C. A. HUMMER

Christ church was filled to capacity yesterday afternoon with the friends who gathered to pay tribute to the memory of Mrs. Evalyn Hummer, whose death occurred Tuesday in San Francisco. The simple but impressive service of the Episcopal church was read by Rev. Mr. Price of Whitefish who filled the pulpit in the absence of a regular rector in this parish. The choir, assisted by W. E. Ruegsegger, Miss Viva Harrington, Miss Bradley and F. J. Robischon, and accompanied by Mrs. W. Q. Conway, sang "Peace, Perfect Peace" and "Lead Kindly Light."

Great masses of flowers which flanked the chancel gave mute evidence of the love and esteem in which Mrs. Hummer was held by the many friends she has made in her long residence in the community, as well as the sympathy felt for Mr. Hummer. A long line of cars followed the body to its last resting place in Conrad Memorial cemetery.

Mrs. Hummer came to Kalispell in 1909 as accountant for the Imperial, and was married to Mr. Hummer at All Saints Cathedral in Spokane October 16, 1911, the marriage being the culmination of a romance begun in their childhood days in Owatonna, Minnesota. Soon after her marriage she developed the malady which finally caused her death, although she made a valiant battle for life, and no effort was spared to enable her to regain her health. For more than ten years, much of her time has been spent in sanitariums in different parts of the country, but until a few weeks before her death she was always cheerful and clung to the hope that she would soon be able to realize her wish to return to her home in Kalispell. Although he has been obliged to remain in Kalispell, Mr. Hummer has spent much time with her in recent years, and was with her before the end came at the sanitarium in San Francisco.

Besides her husband Mrs. Hummer is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Bouquet of St. Paul, and three sisters who reside in the east.
