## FUNERAL OF MRS. EMMA JUDSON HELD YESTERDAY

Funeral services for Mrs. Emma M. Judson were conducted at two b'clock, yesterday in the Baptist hurch, in the presence of a company of friends. Rev. E. Clutter-buck preached the funeral sermon.

Two hymns were sung by the Baptist quartet, composed of Miss Martha Bradley, Miss Velma La-Rue, R. L. Snider and S. E. Salter, and Miss Margaret MacDonald sang a solo also. A lovely tribute of flowers surrounded the casket.

Interment was made in Conrad Memorial cemetery, the bearers being John Bowman, S. J. Purnell, B. B. Gilliland, Clifford Walters, Joe Baker and C. E. Trekel.

Emma M. Judson was the daughter of a Baptist minister, and became both the wife and mother of a minister in the same church. Her son, the late Rev. Truman H. Judson, died here in 1924 while pastor of the local Baptist church. Her bushand was related to the Rev. Admiram Judson, first missionary from America to India.

Mrs. Judson was born in Homer, Ohio, December 19, 1840. Her father, Rev. D. B. Mead of New York state, organized churches in Ohio, Michigan and later in Jowa. December 19, 1858 she married Rev. Truman H. Judson, who was a missionary pastor first in the south, and afterwards served as the first in that work in northwestern Jowa, organizing many of the Baptist churches in that state. He was also a pioneer missionary in South Dakota, and was pastor of the Baptist church at Vermillion for two years. He died March 17, 1884 in Hurley, South Dakota.

Of their seven children, only one daughter, Mrs. J. L. Stewart of Lead, South Dakota, survives. Ten grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren, and a brother, William Mead of Iowa also survive.
