PIONEER OF STATE DIES AT 106 YEARS

Lewistown, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Margaret Layerdure, 106, undbubtedly the oldest woman in Montana, died at her home near Tyler. Mrs. Laverdure was the widow of Xavier Laverdure, a noted early day trapper, who died here a number of years ago. She was born in the Red River country in Canada, and was of French, Canadian and Indian blood. In 1855, she located with her husband in the Milk river section and they lived near the present site of Dodson more than 20 years.

In 1879, they located in Lewistown. Some years ago, following the death of her husband, Mrs. Laverdure moved to Tyler, where her daughter lives. She is survived by four sons and two daughters. The funeral will be Friday afternoon from St. Leo's church here.

He is also survived by his aged mother, Mrs. Mary E. Lingenfelter in Des Moines, Iowa; four brothers, J. V. and Rev. B. H. Lingenfelter of Torrance, California, J. H. of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and E. A. of Des Moines; and one sister, Mrs. J. C. Iverson of Des Moines.
