Henry S. Parker was born in Clinton county, Ohio, June 19. 1846. He was married in Central Square, N. Y., October 21, 1896 to Sarah F. Claxton. They made their home in Peterson Iowa where Mr. Parker was cashier of the Peterson bank. To them, in Peterson, were born five children, Neil C. Henry S. Jr., Vera J. Frances V., and Ida L. all of whom are living except Frances.

Besides his wife and four children he is survived by a brother in Fort Dodge, Iowa and a sister in Jacksonville, Texas.

After retiring from business in 1902 he moved with his family to Spencer, Iowa, and then came west and bought the farm seven miles south of Creston, but he and the family did not move here to live until 1910. After an illness of about three months, he departed this life Saturday noon, January 22, 1927, at his ranch home.
