

FUNERAL OF JAMES MACMAHAN

Funeral services for James M. MacMahan were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Sherman and Son chapel. Rev. B. Scott Bates officiated. The minister emphasized God's protecting care and His sheltering love in the time of life's storms. Miss Walchli and Mrs. Bates, accompanied by Mrs. Fisher, sang "A Shelter in the Time of Storm," "God Will Take Care of You," and "The Rock That is Higher." James Melvin MacMahan was born November 15, 1850 in Flora, Indiana. He was a pioneer in Montana, and an old-time resident of the Flathead valley, having been engaged in ranching in the Birch Grove district for a number of years. Mr. MacMahan passed away April 22, after a lingering illness. He is survived by his widow; three daughters: Miss Fidella MacMahan, of Kalispell, route No. 1; Mrs. Gertrude Schaffer, of Amour, South Dakota; and Mrs. Mary Alt, of Harlowton, Montana; four sons: Manford, of Rosedale, Calif.; Edward A. of Kalispell, route No. 1; Earl, of Lafayette, Indiana; and Bert of Roundup, Montana.

MRS. ELLEN McCARTY, PIONEER, LAID TO REST

Funeral services in memory of Mrs. Ellen McCarthy were held yesterday morning at 10 o'clock at St. Matthew's church. Following the regular mass, Rev. Father Francis O'Farrell spoke in tribute to the beautiful life of Mrs. McCarthy. Recalling the hardships of her pioneer life, he pointed to the debt the present civilization owes to the hardy trail-blazers of the early days.

The large church auditorium was filled with friends, and beautiful flowers were banked about the casket. The pall-bearers, all pioneer friends, were Leon Haines, H. C. Keith, Andrew Swaney, R. J. Bally, J. H. Poy, and Harry Murphy. Interment was made in the family lot in Demersville cemetery under the direction of Waggoner & Campbell.

Obituary

Ellen Geoghagan McCarthy was born in the county of Limerick, Ireland on the fourth day of May, 1841. Left an orphan at the age of nine years, she came to America to live with her oldest sister, who then resided in New Jersey. She married Eugene Edward McCarthy at South Amboy, New Jersey, on April 14, 1865. Six children were born to that union: John, Eugene, Charles, Timothy, Daniel and Nellie, four of whom now survive, together with her grandchild, Nora Hall McCarthy, whom she has raised from infancy. In 1841 the family moved to St. Lawrence county, New York. In 1876 the family again moved to Erie county, Ohio, and left there in the spring of 1879 to come to what was then the Territory of Montana.

They crossed the Missouri river at Bismarck, North Dakota, and came overland during the construction of the Northern Pacific railroad, the first railroad through the territory of Montana. For five years Mrs. McCarthy's life was full of hardships and privations incidental to a pioneer life, living in tents in winter in sub-zero weather, cooking for crews of railroad graders, as well as administering to the care and needs of her family. In May, 1883 the family moved to Flathead valley. There was but one other white woman then living here. The family located a homestead five miles south of Kalispell, where Mr. McCarthy died in 1891, and where she lived until the year, 1909. Since that time she has lived at her home in Ashley, one mile west of Kalispell. At the time of her first illness five weeks ago, she came to her son Eugene's home. Hers was the life of a true Christian, always cheerful and uncomplaining, loved and respected by all who knew her. She spent a useful life of 87 years, the greater part of which were on the frontier. Hers was a life of service to humanity. She often said that she considered the wealth of this world was the amount of good that one could do for humanity during his lifetime.

Mr. Meacham was married in 1895 to Kathleen Wright at Winterset, Iowa. Their oldest son, Rex, gave his life in the Argonne. They have four living children: Mrs. Otis Bienz of Spokane; Fred W., Jackson and Homer A., all of Kalispell.

The deceased is also survived by his mother, who is 88 years old and lives in Iowa; by two sisters, one in Iowa and one in Portland, Oregon; and by two brothers, one in Wyoming and the other in California.

Mr. Meacham was a member of the Masonic fraternity and of the Christian church, having joined the latter in Illinois when a young man. Both his grandfathers were ministers. He, himself, was a patient, persistent, kindly man, loved and respected by all who knew him.
