Funeral rites for Mrs. Maria Bauer were held Sunday afternoon by the Rev. A. Jordan. At 1:40 a brief service was held at the Waggener & Campbell Chapel for the relatives and members of the family, followed by services at the Trinity Lutheran church at 2 o'clock, where many friends gathered. Maria Bauer was born in November, 1847, in Poland and grew to womanhood there, being married in that country. In 1859, Mr. and Mrs. Bauer came to Kalispell, and Mr. Bauer passed away the following year. Mrs. Bauer lived for many years in the vicinity surrounding Kalispell, but eight years ago moved to Hotsan, to live with a daughter. She died in that city last Tuesday at the age of 82 years. She is survived by five children, one of her sons, Edward Bauer, living in Kalispell.

Helena, Mont., Sept. 10.—Funeral services were held here yesterday at an undertaking chapel for Mrs. Mary Batch, wife of C. M. Batch, Helena tailor, who died Sunday at the family home in Kenwood, a suburb, after an illness of several weeks.

Mrs. Batch was born in Denmark in 1869, came to America with her parents when a child and resided in Wisconsin and Minnesota before removing to Montana, in the Eighties. She married Mr. Batch in 1890.

Surviving are Mr. Batch and five sons—Fred J. Warren M. and Raymond P., all of Helena; William M. of Great Falls, and Otto C., of Big Timber, and a daughter, Mrs. Walter H. Smith of Missoula.

PIONEER OF MONTANA IS BURIED AT BUTTE

(By Associated Press)

Butte, Feb. 10.—Impressive funeral services were conducted Thursday afternoon at White's chapel for Henry J. Bose, widely-known old-time resident of Montana, who died Saturday evening after a brief illness. The Rev. Thomas Ashworth officiated in the presence of a host of friends. Burial was in Mount Moriah cemetery.

Mr. Bose came to Montana in 1883 and made his home for a time at Dammersville. Later he devoted considerable time to prospecting in Last Chance gulch, where Helena now stands and later in Bear gulch near Bearmouth. He was also a vice president of the Montana Society of Pioneers.

His fraternal activities included a membership in Morning Star lodge No. 5, A. F. & A. M., and a charter membership in Kalispell lodge No. 42, A. F. & A. M. He was twice past master of the lodge and at the time of his death was a thirty-second degree Mason. During his earlier life he operated a wholesale house at Winnipeg, Canada.

Surviving relatives are his widow, Mrs. Lydia Bose, Berkeley, California; two daughters, Mrs. H. J. Rudolf, Butte; and Mrs. P. W. Hall, of Pomeroy, Washington.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR G. A. BRINKMAN HELD THURSDAY, MAY 8

Funeral services for the late G. A. Brinkman were held Thursday at 2:30 at the Waggoner & Campbell chapel, Rev. A. Jordan of the Trinity Lutheran church officiating.

The chapel was filled to capacity, and the entire front of the room was banked with flowers. Arthur Driscoll sang "Face to Face" and "Abide with Me." As a prelude Maurice Driscoll played "Nearer My God to Thee," and as a postlude "The Holy City."

Burial was made in Conrad Memorial cemetery.

Mr. Brinkman was born in Germany October 27, 1853. He came to this country in 1859, making his residence first at St. Louis, Mo. On April 25, 1889, he was united in marriage to Aurela Wagenknecht, and in September of that year they moved westward to Spokane. In 1891 they came to the Flathead and have made their home here ever since.

Mr. Brinkman was by trade a cabinet maker and carpenter and had the distinction of having built the first house erected in Kalispell. He was always of a very cheerful and happy disposition, and was counted as a friend by all who knew him. He was very public spirited, and always ready and willing to work for anything for the betterment of the community in which he lived.

His death occurred at a hospital in Seattle Sunday, May 4, and was due to a throat trouble with which he had been suffering for a number of years. Beside Mrs. Brinkman he is survived by three sons, Fred A., Walter, and E. C. Brinkman and a sister who resides in Germany.

He had been in failing health for several months but was able to attend to his business until the day he was stricken with his fatal illness.

He came to Kalspell in June, 1891, and has been a resident of Flathead valley most of the years since that time.
