OBITUARY

Edmund Disbrow was born at Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, January 14, 1849 and died at Kalispell, Montana, October 30, 1930. Surviving relatives are his widow, Mrs. Jeannette Disbrow, to whom he was married at Nelson, Nebraska, March 31, 1882, and their three daughters; Mrs. George F. Sutherland, Great Falls, Montana; Mrs. Webster H. Ransom, Spokane; Mrs. John McVay, Great Falls, and one son Dallas G. Disbrow, Lewistown.

Mr. Disbrow was a member of the Presbyterian church and his maternal grandfather was a Presbyterian minister.

Mr. Disbrow came to Kalispell in 1894 after having resided for several years in Nebraska. His wife and young children joined him here the following year. His faith in the bright future of the Flathead country never wavered as was evidenced by his eager willingness always to enlarge real estate holdings here.

As a young man he made several trips from New York city to the western plains country to hunt buffalo, and had many interesting tales to tell of these adventures of an

early day. He drove with single horse and buggy the entire distance from Trenton, New Jersey, to Kalispell, Montana, camping en route and living by aid of rifle and fishing gun.

GRIM REAPER AGAIN VISITS DIMINISHING RANKS, OLD TIMERS

J. A. "Jack" Donahue, an old timer in the ranks of the pioneers, died Friday afternoon at the state Masonic home near Helena.

Mr. Donahue was born in New York 69 years ago and when a boy, took in the Black Hills stampede later drifting onto the Montana buffalo range where he hunted for several years. He was married in the vicinity of Bozeman and came to the Flathead in 1885, locating on a homestead just south of Bad Rock prairie, where the family underwent the hardships incident to early day ranching. Mr. Donahue later served as a deputy under Sheriffs Hubbard and Gregg and also was on the police force of Kalispell. Mr. Donahue made several trips into the Canadian northwest, but he always returned to his Flathead, his favorite country. Of late he had been employed in Glacier Park during the summer seasons. His health failing some time ago, he entered the Masonic home last spring.
