Helena, Feb. 10.—Funeral services were held at an undertaking chapel here today for Edgar L. Fiske, who died last Friday aged 82. The Rev. Henry H. Daniels, pastor of St. Peter's Episcopal church, officiated. Interment was in the Odd Fellows' cemetery here.

Mr. Fiske was a leading contractor and builder here for many years. He was born in Booneville, N. Y., and removed to the west as a young man, engaging in surveying in Minnesota and Montana. He came to Montana in 1870, but went back to Minnesota and later to North Dakota, finally settling here in 1888. He entered contracting here with a brother, E. W. Fiske, who died in 1920. They built most of the residences at Lennox, the Toole mansion on Ewing street and many of the buildings at the state fair grounds.

His widow was Miss Marie Knutson of Waseca, Minnesota. Surviving also are two daughters, Mrs. Leslie Rogers and Mrs. Walter Gebauer, and two granddaughters, all residing here.

MONTANA PIONEER IS BURIED IN HELENA

Helena, Dec. 23.—Funeral services were held today for A. W. Ford, 76, who died December 18, the Rev. David J. Doonan of the First Presbyterian church officiating. Interment was in Forestvale cemetery.

Mr. Ford was stricken by a heart attack while on his way home last Thursday evening, and died as medical aid was being sought. He was a native of Virginia, coming west as a young man. He enlisted in the regular army, and five years of his service was as a member of the Seventh cavalry, in the command of General

Custer. After leaving the service Mr. Ford settled at Helena in 1881, where he lived continuously until his death. Surviving are a brother, E. F. Ford, and two nephews, Albert and Charles of Lincoln, Nebraska, and two nieces, Mrs. Ira Tuck of Helena, and Mrs. Carter Rubottom of Gray Cliff, Montana.
