### Obituary

The passing of Mrs. Irene Morri-man Houtz, wife of George M. Houtz, at their Forest Brook home 16 miles west of Kalispell on Tuesday, September 30, takes from the community a highly respected citizen, a devoted wife and mother and to all humanly a loyal friend. Mr. and Mrs. Houtz were united in marriage at Blundt, South Dakota on September 28, 1887, and four years later came to Kalispell, where they have since made their home. Mrs. Houtz united with the First Presbyterian church in Kalispell more than a quarter of a century ago, was connected with a number of civic and benevolent societies, and while contributing largely to the success and upbuilding of these organizations and the general community welfare, her first consideration was for her home and family. A woman of exceptional character and strong convictions, her home life was all that could be desired. That she never failed in her duties as wife and mother is evidenced by the fact that she reared to full maturity three sons and a daughter without moral blemish and who are highly respected in their several communities: Irvin M., of Missoula; Edward L., of Spokane; Mrs. Cora Houtz Johnson, of Kalispell; and George M. Houtz, Jr., late of Portland, Oregon, now residing at the Forest Brook home.

Mrs. Houtz had been in failing health for several years, but not until a year ago did her condition become alarming. While all that medical skill, assisted by loving hearts and willing hands, could do was done it was without avail, and she gradually failed until last Tuesday, when, surrounded by her devoted family, she passed to her reward.

## W. F. HUBBART DEAD; TO BE BURIED HERE

The Elks lodge was today advised of the death of W. F. Hubbart, well known pioneer resident of Flathead county, at Ashland, Oregon, yesterday. It was stated that burial will be made here, but the date has not yet been determined.

Fillmore Hubbart, as he was generally known among his associates of the early days, was elected sheriff of the county in 1898 and served two terms, and was also prominent as a business man and rancher.

He erected the livery barn on the site where the federal building now stands, and conducted that business for a number of years. He afterwards formed a partnership with H. C. Keith in a ranch on the Little Bitter Root beyond Marlon, which is still known as the Hubbart ranch although he has not been connected with it for many years.

He came here in Homerville days, and was engaged in the contracting business in the old town. Sidney M. Logan recalls that at the time he was elected sheriff the court house then occupied what is now the Kallispell Mercantile company building. His father and a brother, Henry Hubbart, also resided here at that time, but both have since died. After leaving Kallispell some twenty-odd years ago he engaged in the grocery business in Spokane, but while there he met with an accident which permanently impaired his health. He then moved to Ashland, Oregon, and few of his old friends have heard from him since. He was one of the best liked men in Kallispell in the early days, Mr. Logan says, and his old friends will regret to learn of his death.

He was 72 years of age, and was one of the early members of the Kallispell lodge of Elks. He also belonged to the Knights of Pythias.
