He erected the livery barn on the site where the federal building now stands, and conducted that business for a number of years. He afterwards formed a partnership with H. C. Keith in a ranch on the Little Bitter Root beyond Marion, which is still known as the Hubbart ranch although he has not been connected with it for many years.

He came here in Demersville days, and was engaged in the contracting business in the old town. Sidney M. Logan recalls that at the time he was elected sheriff the court house then occupied what is now the Kalfapell Mercantile company building His father and a brother, Henry Hubbart, also resided here at that time, but both have since died, After legving Kall-speil some twenty-odd years ago be engaged in the grocery business in Snokane, but while there no met with an accident which permanently impaired his health. He then moved to Ashland, Oregon, and few of his old friends have heard from him since. He was one of the best liked men in Kalispell in the early days. Mr. Logan says, and his old friends will regret to learn of his death.

He was 72 years of age, and was one of the early members of the Kalispell todge of Elks. He also belonged to the Kuights of Pythias.
