Mr. Knerr was born in Iowa 70 years ago, and when a young man, came to Montana, where he settled at Fort Benton. Later he went to Judith Basin, where he was interested in a sheep ranch. In 1909, he came to Dayton, Montana, and conducted the Dayton Mercantile company, later going to Elmo. Here he opened a store, but in six years sold out and came to Kalispell, where he had been since. In 1909, Mr. Knerr married Mrs. Katie Lilly of Great Falls. During the last year and a half, Mr. Knerr was employed at the upper Holt ferry at Therriault and had resided at the home of Louis Frye on Third avenue east. He died at the Frye home after an illness of two weeks.
