Vergie Marie Marshall, age 25 years, born Friday, January 26, 1905, Belle Fourche, South Dakota, fell asleep in Jesus at the Coffey Hospital, Portland, Oregon, 12:10 p. m., Saturday, September 13, 1930.

Her life, rich in meaning and beautiful in character, was complete; her task was done. She entered the Kallispell grade school and graduated from the Flathead County high school with the Class of 1924. In 1926 she graduated from the normal department of the Seattle Pacific College, Seattle, Washington. The succeeding two years were filled with service for the Mountain States Power company, Kallispell, where her faithfulness and cheerful smiles won for her an ever-increasing number of friends. In January 1929, she continued her studies at the University of Washington, improving her natural, artistic talents.

Her illness came on gradually. On July 23, two days before the completion of her degree, she was forced to discontinue her studies.

Saturday, August 30, she was to have been united in marriage to Paul Wernitch Wright at the home of her parents Mr. and Mrs. P. B. Marshall. Because of her illness, the wedding was postponed. Two weeks later she departed for her home beyond the skies. She now wears the dress in which she was to have been married and on her finger rests the ring, symbolic of a love made on earth, to be continued in heaven.

Her life was marked with a courage undefeatable. During the prolonged and painful sickness, she suff-

ered in the face of suffering impossible to understand. During moments of depression she looked forward to brighter moments. Her courageous spirit is characterized in this motto made by her own hands and proceeded from her own life:

"Make the best of everything,
Think the best of everybody,
Hope the best for yourself."

She was converted at the early age of nine years. Her life of service was giving of herself for others. To her this was a source of joy. The concern of her prayer life was the salvation of those who knew not the great love of God. She has gone to claim the reward given to those who run well the race.

Her loved ones and many friends deeply grieve her absence. She is absent but for a season, till we meet again. The place she has occupied in our hearts will forever remain sacred. Her beautiful character and accomplishments have not been in vain, for her influence lives on.

At that time he did a lot of fine work that required the very highest mechanical skill.

He was genius, I know him to open a safe, that the combination was jammed in an attempt to rob M. An expert from the factory failed to open it and they sent for John to drill the lock. He asked to try to open the door, which he did in less than 2 hours. No man ever had a truer friend than John Montpetit.
