William Thomas Nelson was born in Nodaway county, Missouri, October, 1857, where he grew to manhood. For years he was employed on the St. Joseph (Missouri) Gazette and the Kansas City Journal. Mr. Nelson was a professional musician of some note and did reportorial detail on the Leavenworth Times during the days of Nordica, Melba and other past grand opera stars.

In 1911, with his family, he came to Roundup, where he was foreman of the Roundup Tribune. In 1921, he came to Whitefish and was employed on the Whitefish Pilot. His health failed, and he was forced to lead an outdoor life. He secured employment with the Great Northern as watchman in Bad Rock canyon.

Mr. Nelson was taken to Mayo's hospital in Rochester a year ago, where it was found he was suffering from cancer. An operation was performed which prolonged his life until March 5, 1930. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Grace Nelson of KallsPELL, four children and four grandchildren, and a sister in Illinois.
