

OBITUARY

Dr. J. E. Parker, for many years minister and prohibition lecturer in western Montana, died Saturday at his home in Corvallis, near Missoula. About five or six years ago, Dr. Parker was pastor of the Kallispell Christian church, where he made many friends. Dr. Parker was pastor of the Missoula Christian church before ill health forced him to accept a smaller pastorate at Corvallis, where he served for more than three years. Two years ago he resigned his position and with his wife and daughter went to Arizona. The family returned to Montana a year ago and Dr. and Mrs. Parker spent the summer at their ranch west of Missoula, going to Corvallis in the winter.

Dr. Parker was born in Peoria, Illinois 60 years ago and was educated for the ministry in the colleges of the middle west. He had much ability as a public speaker and for 33 years spoke in the pulpits of the Christian churches.

CHARLES M. PIERCE BIGFORK FARMER, LAID TO REST IN MISSOULA

According to word received by friends, Charles K. Pierce, 65, rancher of Bigfork, who had been visiting a daughter in Missoula, died at a local hospital here Sunday.

Mr. Pierce had gone to Missoula about two weeks ago to spend the summer with his daughter, Mrs. F. A. Kriebs. Shortly after he arrived he became ill and was taken to the hospital for medical treatment.

Mr. Pierce was a native of Iowa, born at New Liberty, that state, and came to Montana 19 years ago from Idaho. He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Kriebs of Missoula, and by three sons, Ernest C. Pierce and Albert L. Pierce of Bigfork, and Harry A. Pierce of Long Beach, California.

H. G. POMEROY DIES SUDDENLY OF HEART ATTACK

Judge C. W. Pomeroy this morning received a message informing him of the death of his brother H. G. Pomeroy at Eureka. He had been suffering with heart trouble for some time, but his death was unexpected as he had been able to be up and attend to his business as usual until the last.

Mr. Pomeroy came to Flathead county and taught school at Ban Rock in 1889 and 1899. He afterward came to Kallispell where he was admitted to the bar and practiced law here until 1906, when he located in Eureka. He has always been prominent in politics, and was elected as representative from Flathead county in 1907. After the creation of Lincoln county he was elected state senator, and was serving his second term at the time of his death. He was born in Holton, Kansas, in March 1876.

Of his immediate family he is survived only by his wife, and his brother, Judge Pomeroy, who left today for Eureka.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.
