ST. IGNATIUS MOTHER SLAYS HER TWO BABES AND COMMITS SUICIDE

USES SMALL-CALIBER RIFLE TO KILL SELF AND TOTS—
HUSBAND SEES BLAZE IN HOME AND COMES IN TO
FIND TRAGEDY. LAKE COUNTY AUTHORITIES DEEM
HOLDING OF INQUEST UNNECESSARY.

Polson, July 10.—Mrs. Guy E. Royer, 26, killed her two babies, aged two months and two and one-half years, and then shot herself with a small-caliber rifle at 9 o'clock yesterday morning.

The Royers lived four miles north of St. Ignatius. Mr. Royer, who was working in a nearby field saw fire at the home. He rushed in to extinguish the flames and found the three bodies. They had all been shot through the temples.

Lake county officers who were called to the scene found the interior of the house saturated with kerosene. It was evident that Mrs. Royer's first intention had been to cremate herself and children. The babies' crib had been set afire, but apparently she changed her mind and shot the babies and then herself. No motive for the tragedy has been advanced.

After an inspection by Lake county authorities, an inquest was deemed unnecessary.

For the last eight years she has spent a part of the time at the Soldiers' Home, Columbia Falls, and spent the winter in Spokane, with her daughter, Mrs. James N. Bingham, coming from there to the Home two months ago. She was very ill until her death April 27. She leaves two daughters, Mrs. Maggie Moss, Kennewick, Washington and Mrs. Achsa Bingham, Whitlash, Montana; four sons, F. T. Parsell of Gold Butte, Montana, C. R. Parsell of Gold Butte, Montana, H. S. Parsell of Dillon, and R. W. Sprague, Washington, a sister, Mrs. A. G. Bartholomew, of Hephner, Oregon, 17 grand children, 14 great grandchildren.
