Obituary

George Fredenberg was born in Sullivan county, New York, July 19, 1848, and died February 3, 1931.

At the age of 19 he moved from New York state to Pennsylvania, where in 1882 he was united in marriage with Miss Laura Pettibone. To this union came six children: two daughters, Mrs. Hans Petersen and Mrs. Harley Swisher, and four sons, Anson, Myles, Ward and Harry, the latter having preceded Mr. Fredenberg in death.

The Fredenbergs came to Kalispell January 3, 1893, making this their home since that date.

Mr. Fredenberg became a member of the Methodist Episcopal church in 1895.
