## John Hubert Graves

The River Falls Journal, River Falls, Wisconsin, gives the following obituary of John H. Graves, former Kalispell resident, whose death occurred March 20:

John H. Graves was born in Water Valley, Indiana, February 13, 1885, and passed away in River Falls, from pneumonia March 20, 1931, after an illness of but four days' duration. Funeral services were conducted from the Masonic Temple Monday, March 23 with burial in Greenwood cemetery.

Leaving Indiana when a child he moved with his parents to Chicago Heights, Illinois, where he grew to manhood. With his parents he moved to the Pacific coast and in 1906 moved to Kalispell, Montana, in which vicinity he had resided with the exception of a year and a half spent in River Falls.

On March 23, 1913 he was united in marriage to Mary Louise Thomas. The family resided in Kalispell until a couple of weeks ago when they came to this city to make their home on the Foster farm.

Only those who knew him intimately could appreciate his fine qualities of heart and mind. Quiet and unassuming in manner, only those nearest and dearest to him knew him for his warm devotion to his home and family, of his untiring effort in giving to them the best he had to offer. As expressed by his former pastor in Kalispell, "Just to have such a man for the father of your children is better than all the riches in the world."

He is survived by his wife, five children, his father and mother and two brothers.

Gregg, crossed the plains in a covered wagon and they settled at Bonita, Montana, where her father was a contractor. Later the family moved to Itavali and there she met and married G. L. Blodgett in 1890. At that time the family moved to Demersville and later to Kalspell. To this union two children were born, C. F. Blodgett of Seattle and Mrs. Guy E. Frankentfield of Spokane.

This first was dissolved and on November 15, 1910 she married L. G. Schaffer, who died a few years later. After Mr. Schaffer's death, Mrs. Schaffer made her home with her son in Seattle and for the past two years with her daughter, Mrs. Guy E. Frankentfield of N. 3318 E. Street, Spokane, where she died.

Mrs. Schaffer was a government employe for twenty-three years, working in the Kalspell post office as a substitute on all rural routes. In two years more she would have received a life pension, but was forced to give up her work due to ill health. In addition to her two children, she is survived by five sisters, Mrs. F. B. Kliphouse, Seattle, Mrs. Emma Jamieson and Mrs. Thomas McDermott, Kalspell, Mrs. Robert Graves, Plains, Montana and Mrs. Cunningham, Seattle.

Mrs. Schaffer always had the spirit of a pioneer, taking active part in all early day celebrations and was always a friend to the end. She was buried from the Mission Funeral Home at 1 p. m. on November 17 and was interred in the Riverside Park

cemetery, Rev. A. Ostedahl officiating.
