IS BURIED IN HELENA**

Helena, Dec. 31.—Funeral services were held here yesterday for Sam C. Hudson, an oldtime and widely known mining man, who passed away Monday at his home here.

Dr. D. B. Price of the Methodist church conducted services and interment was made in a local cemetery.

Mr. Hudson was born in Missouri on Christmas day, 1849, and when a child of three went with his parents to California on the Overland Trail. He lived in Marion county, California, until 1867, when he removed to Silver City, Idaho. He left there in 1876 for the Black Hills of South Dakota, where he was among the first miners. Soon after the Custer massacre, Mr. Hudson came to eastern Montana and for a time was employed by the government at Fort Custer, as a wood contractor.

He removed in 1877 to Marysville, where he located, eventually, several noted gold claims. He also owned mines in the Scratch Gravel district near Helena. He made his home here since 1878, while operating through the entire Helena mining district.

Mr. Hudson was unmarried. A brother, two nephews and a niece survive.
