When Montana was still a territery and the buffalo, and antelope were grazing in the vast stretches of the prairie land from the Continental Divide to the Dakota line, Mand Talbett was hern in Butte, the date being August 10, 1879. A plonger in her own right, she was of a race that pushed forward in the face of every danger and obstacle to help win the West for civilization. With her parents she moved to Columbia Falls in 1899, where her father hullt a beautiful home on the West bank of Flathead river and where she lived with her family until she married Dr. John Arthur Lamb, December 30th, 1909. Following her marriage she moved to Kalispell where she resided untid her death, August 31, 1931.

Mrs. Lamb was a sweet and lovable character and she won friends by the hundreds in Kallspell, Columbia Falls and throughout the valter generally.

Her father, James Talbott, died even years ago at the age of \$4 These 84 years were filled alth adventure and high achievegent. He was one of Montana's east respected citizens. A native of thio, he was taken to Missouri by the parents during his 12th year and t the age of 17 be began the pionering life which has brought so such of romance and achievement to he annals of the West. In the year samed he began his career as an verland freighter to California and a that golden region he followed sauy of the picturesque occupations hat were a part of the dally life of he period, but in the shifting and ver changing activities of our connly, are now numbered among the est arts and occupations. Crossing he Death Valley with the use of amels, carrying the mails from Unsa o San Diego, prospecting, teaming nd mining were among these netivi les. Among other adventurous undertakings, he crossed the Isthnus of Panama on foot when that egion was an incubator of Yellow ever and other sub-tropical maladis. He sailed around the Horn and earched the wastes of Australia for old. His wandering footsteps led im to practically every country in outh America. Buck to California. Nevada, and finally in 1363 he ecame one of the Acquionts that rected from Alder Gulch its hiden wealth and helped to establish ie civilization of Montana on a firm nd enduring basis. During his resience in Montana he was engaged in sining, farming and banking, and s said to be one of the pioneer prosectors and miners of Libby Creek; a Lincoln county. In 1875 he was sarried to Miss Jose L. Raugdell, erself the daughter of a Montana ioneer family.

This was the heritage of Mand falbott Lamb, sweet patient woman had she was. Loved and beloved, arrying the suffering of a protract diffuses with herote fortifude and abmission to the inovitable, blemad ofth the love and affection of a plendid family and the loval devotion of a husband and sister who give to her the tenderest care and affection.
