Funeral services for Maud Talbott Lamb, wife of Dr. J. Arthur Lamb, who passed away on August 31, at 2:50 p. m. at her home 422 Fourth avenue east, were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Christ Episcopal church. The Episcopal service was conducted by Rev. Richard Price of Whitefish and burial was in Conrad Memorial cemetery under the direction of Sherman & Son.

Two hymns, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" and "Safe In The Arms of Jesus," were sung by the choir, accompanied by Mrs. W. Q. Conway at the organ.

Maud Levina Talbott was born in Butte, August 10, 1879, the daughter of James A. and Jose L. Ramsdell Talbott. She was raised and educated in Butte schools and later attended school at San Jose, California. About 32 years ago she moved to Columbia Falls with her parents who were early pioneers, having come to the state in the early 60's and settled in Butte where Mr. Talbott was prominent in Butte Mining centers and after moving to Columbia Falls he was active in the development of that region and engaged in banking.

On December 30, 1909, Maud Levina Talbott was united in marriage at the home of her father at Columbia Falls, to Dr. J. Arthur Lamb of Kalispell and since that time has resided here.

Mrs. Lamb was of a retiring disposition because of delicate health, but she was always very kind to inquire about others especially during their illness or misfortune and her passing will be keenly felt in this community where she spent the past 23 years of her life.

Mrs. Lamb was a member of the Christ Episcopal church and a member of Adsh Chapter No. 17, Order of Eastern Star.

Obituary

When Montana was still a territory and the buffalo and antelope were grazing in the vast stretches of the prairie land from the Continental Divide to the Dakota line, Maud Talbott was born in Butte, the date being August 10, 1879. A pioneer in her own right, she was of a race that pushed forward in the face of every danger and obstacle to help win the West for civilization. With her parents she moved to Columbia Falls in 1899, where her father built a beautiful home on the West bank of Flathead river and where she lived with her family until she married Dr. John Arthur Lamb, December 30th, 1909. Following her marriage she moved to Kalispell where she resided until her death, August 31, 1931.

Mrs. Lamb was a sweet and lovable character and she won friends by the hundreds in Kalispell, Columbia Falls and throughout the valley generally.

Her father, James Talbott, died seven years ago at the age of 84 years. These 84 years were filled with adventure and high achievement. He was one of Montana's best respected citizens. A native of Ohio, he was taken to Missouri by the parents during his 12th year and at the age of 17 he began the pioneering life which has brought so much of romance and achievement to the annals of the West. In the year named he began his career as an overland freighter to California and in that golden region he followed many of the picturesque occupations that were a part of the daily life of the period, but in the shifting and ever changing activities of our country, are now numbered among the lost arts and occupations. Crossing the Death Valley with the use of mules, carrying the mails from Uman to San Diego, prospecting, tanning, and mining were among these activities. Among other adventurous undertakings, he crossed the Isthmus of Panama on foot when that region was an incubator of Yellow fever and other sub-tropical maladies. He sailed around the Horn and searched the wastes of Australia for gold. His wandering footsteps led him to practically every country in South America. Back to California, to Nevada, and finally in 1863 he became one of the Argonauts that receded from Alder Gulch its hidden wealth and helped to establish the civilization of Montana on a firm and enduring basis. During his residence in Montana he was engaged in mining, farming and banking, and is said to be one of the pioneer prospectors and miners of Libby Creek in Lincoln county. In 1875 he was married to Miss Jose L. Ramsdell, herself the daughter of a Montana pioneer family.

This was the heritage of Maud Talbott Lamb, sweet patient woman that she was. Loved and beloved, carrying the suffering of a protracted illness with heroic fortitude and submission to the inevitable, blessed with the love and affection of a placid family and the loyal devotion of a husband and sister who gave to her the tenderest care and affection.

She is survived by a sister Mrs. Thomas E. Linden and nephews, Tom and James Linden, of Milwaukie, Oregon, and her husband Dr. John
