Funeral services for Duncan McBain, pioneer resident of Columbia Falls, were held there yesterday at 2 p. m., under the auspices of the Masonic Lodge, of which he was a member. Services were conducted by Rev. A. C. Cain of Kalispell, assisted by Rev. Price of Whitefish. A quartette from the Masonic lodge composed of Dr. Lamb, Andrew Dunsire, H. B. Henriksen and H. L. Obituary

Duncan McBain was born in Gault Canada, August 1, 1853, and died in Columbia Falls, November 19, 1931.

The McBain family moved from Canada to Michigan and settled on a farm. There in 1879 Mr. McBain was united in marriage to Miss Eleanor Bracolin, and to them seven children were born, six of whom are still living. They are: Miss Mabel McBain, Everett, Washington, Mrs. Ethel Bridges, Seattle, Mrs. Helen Glendenning, Kalispell, Miss Lois McBain, Seattle, Hugh McBain, Seattle and Burton McBain, Columbia Falls. A brother, William McBain of McBain, Michigan, also survives.

While Mr. McBain lived in Michigan he was Superintendent of Schools of Missaukee county for 14 years and County Treasurer for 4 years. After moving to Columbia Falls he worked for a number of years as timber cruiser for the Somers Lumber Company and during his last few years he has been an employee of the school in Columbia Falls.

Mr. McBain was a great lodge man. He was a member of the Odd Fellows, the Eastern Star, and a Past Master of the Masonic Lodge No. 89. Some have said that Masonry was his religion, and while in part that may be true, nevertheless he was also a churchman. His family came from Scotch Presbyterian stock, and while he did not affiliate with the Methodist church of Columbia Falls, still he was a regular attendant and supporter.
