Obituary

Haney E. Vaught was born in Newport, Virginia, on September 17, 1880 and died in the Flathead valley October 24, 1931, at the age of 51 years.

In 1907 he was united in marriage with Maye Wise. Besides his devoted wife, he leaves his mother of Newport, Virginia, four brothers living in Warren, Ohio, Blacksburg, Virginia, New Port, Virginia, and Charleston, Missouri. Also two sisters, both living in the vicinity of Newport, Virginia. He also leaves many other friends and relatives to mourn his death.

In 1903 he came to this valley from New York, and located at Belton, Mont., where he was employed as a civil engineer for the Great Northern Railway. This position he held until 1910, when he was employed by Major Logan, Superintendent of Glacier National park, to lay out some of the first trails of the new National park. Since that time he has cleared a farm near Belton worked at many engineering jobs, and was serving as county engineer for Flathead County at the time of his death.

In his youth he was affiliated with the Methodist church in Virginia. At the time of his death he was a member of the Elks lodge, a very faithful member of the Masonic Lodge of Columbia Falls and the Order of Eastern Star all of Columbia Falls.
