Ross which con-tinued until his death following a brief illness, Mr. Allison was married in 1914 at Sentinal Butte, North Dakota, to Miss Valentine Martin of Kalispell, who survives him with their three children, Evelyn, age 16; Allen, 10, and William 9, also a brother, Dr. George Allison, Hamilton, Ontario, three sisters, Mrs. Jean Builer of St. Catherines, Ontario; Mrs. Ethel Stoker of Toronto, Canada; Mrs. Gertrude Atnaley of New Jersey, and Alex Allison of Cloveand, Ohio.
