

SERVICES HELD FOR McJIMPSEY CAMPBELL

Funeral services for McJimpsey Campbell were held Friday afternoon at 2:30 at the Soldiers' Home chapel by Rev. H. C. Mecklenberg of Columbia Falls and interment was in the Soldiers' Home cemetery under the direction of Waggener & Campbell.

Obituary

McJimpsey Campbell was born September 18, 1851, at Bloomsburg, Ohio. On October 11, 1878, he enlisted in Troop "D" 7th regiment, U. S. Cavalry, at Cincinnati, Ohio, and served five years, or until October 10, 1883, at which time he was honorably discharged from the service with the rank of first sergeant.

Comrade Campbell and wife came to the Flathead valley some forty-odd years ago, arriving in Demersville where he worked at his trade as a carpenter until the year 1891, when they moved to Kalispell. Here he took a clerkship with the firm of Whitwell & Klenc, merchants. Later this firm was succeeded by the Conlin Mercantile company with whom Mr. Campbell engaged, staying with them until the year 1916, when he and Mrs. Campbell moved to Belton, Montana, where he clerked for the Dow Mercantile company until 1921, when such company was succeeded by George W. Slack in whose service Mr. Campbell engaged until the summer of 1926.

On October 16, 1926, Mr. and Mrs. Campbell were admitted to the Montana Soldiers' Home, where they have since resided.

On January 9, 1932, Comrade Campbell was suddenly taken ill and on January 13 at 3 o'clock a. m., passed away at the age of 80 years.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Campbell, a daughter, married, living at Homestead, Fla., also two brothers, H. S. and W. C. Campbell, and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Loomis and Mrs. Eliza Anderson, all residents of the state of Iowa.

He received his early education in Oregon schools and when a young man came to Montana, where he engaged in the sheep business. Later he went to Helena to manage a livery stable. While there he was married to Mrs. Mary Merritt Stooka. They came to the Flathead in 1889 where they purchased and built up a fine farm home for their family near Creston. Later, they moved to Kalispell, that the children might attend high school.

In 1907 they moved to California, where the family has since resided.

Mrs. Churchill passed away in October, 1922.

Mr. Churchill was known and loved by many people who enjoyed his ever-pleasant manner and extraordinary activity even in old age. Since making his home in California he had made many trips to the Flathead to look after interests here and to renew old acquaintances.
