Obituary

John M. Fields was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, October 17, 1846. On May 21, 1864 he enlisted as a Private in Co-F, 44th Iowa Infantry and was honorably discharged at Davenport, Iowa, September 15, 1864. In September 10, 1873 he married Hannah Ann Pearson at Marion, County of Linn, Iowa and later came to Montana and took up

their residence at Creston, Flathead county from which place they came to the Montana Soldiers' Home taking up their residence there January 15, 1925. Comrade Fields had always enjoyed good health until a short time before his passing away December 16, 1932 at 7:45 o'clock p. m., aged 86 years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Hannah A. Fields; one son, Thomas M. Fields, of Creston, Montana and a married daughter, Mrs. Susanna Nevilles, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Obituary

John H. Foy, son of John M. and Alice Foy, was born in Ogden, Utah, on November 27, 1857, and was one of a family of nine children. He died at Oroville, Washington, September 2, 1932, at the age of 74 years. With his parents he came to Bozeman, Montana, where he was married to Miss Nancy Jane Gregg, in 1879. To them three children were born: Earl, who died in infancy; Murdon H., also deceased, and Gordon H. Foy, of Olympia, Washington. With his wife and parents he came to Flathead county September 22, 1883, and settled at Foy's Lake, where he erected the first saw mill in this part of Montana. Afterwards he homesteaded near Demersville, at Foy's bend. The lake, where they first settled, bears his father's name and the bend in the river where he homesteaded bears his name.

Mrs. Foy died five years ago, and he is survived by one son, Gordon H. Foy; also by two brothers, Lester L. Foy of Kalispell and Andrew Foy of Louise, Idaho, and four sisters, Mrs. Andrew Swancy of Columbia Falls, Mrs. Alice Vintage of Seattle, and Mrs. George Whistler and Mrs. Elmer Parsons, both of Oroville, Washington.
