Obituary

Henry Hoffman was born in Germany October 20, 1851, and passed away at Warm Springs, Montana July 30, 1932, at the age of 80 years. As a young man he took up the trade of blacksmith. He came to America in 1878 and lived in Wisconsin and later in Colorado. About 1885 he moved to Racetrack, Montana.

He was married to Mrs. Amanda Cain in Anaconda, August 9, 1911 and came to Kalispell to live at that time.

He is survived by a nephew and niece in Colorado.

Obituary

Dr. Hugh E. Houston was born at Echo, Minnesota, December 31, 1874. He was educated in the local schools of that place until he entered the University of Minnesota. He graduated in 1900 and came to Kalispell in 1901 as surgeon for the Great Northern, moving to Whitefish when the division was moved to that point. He returned to Kalispell in 1914 and has resided here since, spending part of his time for the past four years in California.

He was a member of the Flathead County Medical society, Montana State Medical society, American Medical and a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

His immediate family includes Mrs. Houston, three daughters and a son, Mrs. Herbert K. Chase of Long Beach, California, Virginia, Mary-Patricia and Hugh E., Jr., of Kalispell. He is also survived by three brothers and three sisters, H. R. Houston of Kalispell, Roderick of Belton, and George of Wood Lake, Minnesota; Mrs. A. H. Heuser of Grand Island, Nebraska, Mrs. C. H. Jennings of Whitefish and Dr. Frances Houston of Seattle.
