Harry Herbert Maher, Jr., was born in Canton, Ohio, September 20 1895, the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Maher. He graduated from the Staples, Minnesota, high school in 1912 and was employed in the Northern Pacific ticket office at Staples one year, attended the University of Minnesota two years, and entered railroad service for two years in various capacities before coming to Montana in 1918. Two years were spent in the local railroad offices and in 1920 he accepted a position with the Invader Oil and Gas company in Muskogee, Oklahoma.

In October, 1920, he was married to Miss Amy Stenerson of Whitefish, Montana, in Kansas City, Missouri. He became secretary and treasurer of the Seaboard Oil and Gas company, and in 1922 he was put in charge of their New York office, holding that position for three years, returning later to Texas and Oklahoma. This position he held until the time of his death. He spent the past three years in Whitefish in an effort to regain failing health. He passed away Sunday at 2:45 p. m., following a stroke, suffered Wednesday, September 14.

Surviving are his widow, Amy J. Maher, his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Maher, and one brother, Rollin, all of Whitefish.

**GREAT THRONG PAYS
LAST TRIBUTE TO
CHARLES B. MARCH**

A great throng gathered at 3:30 yesterday afternoon to pay tribute to the memory of Charles B. March, whose death occurred unexpectedly Monday morning. The Waggener and Campbell chapel was filled to capacity, and many were barely able to find standing room in the hallways.

The services were under the auspices of the Masonic lodge, of which he had long been a member, Rev. Chas. Wilson of the Episcopal church officiating. A quartette composed of Dr. Lamb, A. J. Driscoll, Don Shepard and Hugh Fisher sang "Lead Kindly Light," and "Abide With Me," accompanied at the piano by Mrs. H. E. Robbin.

The front of the chapel was banked high with flowers, a tribute of the friends he had made during a residence of over a score of years in the Flathead valley. The pall bearers were: George Bjorneby, T. C. Hand, C. A. Hummer, John Sherman, G. A. Miller and C. H. Foot.

Mr. March was born at Malone, N. Y., September 4, 1864, and moved when a boy to Minneapolis, where he later became affiliated with the Red River Lumber Company as manager. He came to Montana in August, 1910 as manager of the Enterprise Lumber company, and afterward held a similar position with the State Lumber company. In 1929 he organized the Flathead Lumber company, and was at the head of this firm at the time of his death.

He was married on July 17, 1894 to Miss Carrie J. Brown, and besides Mrs. March is survived by their one son, Willis March, of this city, and a sister, residing in New York.

He was a member of Kharan Lodge No. 12, A. F. & A. M. Minneapolis Consistory No. 2, Scottish Rite Masons, a life member of the Minneapolis Shrine and Helena Court No. 5, of the Royal Order of Jesters. When the Kalispell Rotary club was organized he was chosen as its first president; he was a director of the First National Bank, and was always active in Chamber of Commerce work, as well as every community enterprise.

Although but few persons were aware of it, he had been actively co-operating with county officials in poor relief work for many months and had done much to alleviate the condition of poor families, and in many cases personally furnished food and clothing to the needy.

One of his outstanding characteristics was his never-failing cheerfulness and good nature. He had a keen sense of humor, and always had a cheery greeting and a kind word for everyone with whom he came in contact.

Following the service at the chapel a long line of cars followed the body to its last resting place in Conrad Memorial cemetery, where interment was made with Masonic ritual.

Helena, Jan. 18.—Funeral services were held here Saturday for Col. J. J. McGuinness, former commander of the 163rd U. S. Inf., Montana national guard, who died here Wednesday night. The ceremony was conducted at St. Helena Cathedral. The right Rev. George F. Finnigan, bishop of the diocese of Helena of the Roman Catholic church, officiated. Burial, with full military honors, was in Resurrection cemetery here.

Colonel McGuinness was born in Liverpool, Eng., in 1860. He came to this country at the age of 22 and settled first at St. Paul, Minnesota. He removed to Montana in 1892. He was a court stenographer by profession and served as secretary to

Judge Albert J. Galen of Helena during his incumbency as attorney general of Montana, and to Dan M. Kelly, of Butte, when Mr. Kelly held that office. He leaves a widow and three sons and two daughters.

Besides World war service, Col. McGuinness commanded a battalion of the 163rd on the Mexican border, just preceding the World struggle.
