Helena, Nov. 24.—Funeral services were held at Augusta Wednesday for Mrs. Helen Auchard, 97, who died November 19 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. O. A. Kenek. A large number of friends from the northern section of Lewis and Clark county and Helena attended the services, which concluded with commitment rites of the Order of the Eastern Star. The body was brought to Helena, where interment took place in Forestvale cemetery beside the grave of Mrs. Auchard's husband, Richard Auchard, who died in 1916. Mrs. Auchard was born in Northbay, N. Y., where she married Edgar Nellis. Following his death she married Mr. Auchard, and came to Montana more than 50 years ago. She was one of the oldest members of the Order of Eastern Star in Montana and was widely known and highly esteemed for her delightful personality and sterling character. She had been ill but a few months before her death. Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. Kenek of Augusta; Mrs. Mina Nellis Vandenberg of Helena and Adele Nellis of Sun River; a son, James Nellis of Sun River; and a number of grand children and great grandchildren. A stepson, Willard Auchard operates the farm and livestock business formerly owned by his father, near Augusta.

For a number of years he taught school near his home, and interspersed this occupation with farming for which he always had great liking. During these early years of manhood he united with the Presbyterian church.

In 1893 he married Miss Bertha Bunuel and for several years lived in Litchfield, where he was employed in the newspaper business. Later they moved to Pierre, South Dakota, where Mr. Aylesworth was manager of the water and gas plant. While at Pierre he joined the Knights of Pythias Lodge, and later transferred his membership to Kalispell, where he was a member at the time of his death.

After a period when he farmed in Minnesota, he moved to Kalispell in 1903. For 18 years the family lived on a ranch in Smith Valley, where Mr. Aylesworth took much pleasure and pride in the development of pure-bred stock.

For the past 10 years he has been a resident of Kalispell, where for the most part he was employed by the Kalispell Mercantile company.

Mr. Aylesworth passed away at his home on December 26, 1933, after an illness of several months. Surviving him are his widow and two sons, Cecil E., of Mt. Vernon, Washington, and Ernest, of Round Butte, Montana; ten grandchildren and two sisters, Mrs. Winifred Wilkins of Paradise, California, and Mrs. G. R. Bancroft of Rudyard, Montana.
