FUNERAL SERVICES HELD AT HELENA FOR VETERAN PROSPECTOR

Helena, March 15 .- Funeral services were held at a mortuary chapel. for George Howard, 90, who died on March 11 after a short illness. The Rev. Arthur A. Moore, pastor of St. James African M. E. church officiated and burial was in Forestvale. The attendance was large and includedmany friends of the veteran prospector of both the white and negroraces. Mr. Howard had been a familiar figure in Helena for more than 50 years. He was born in a southern state, a slave to a wealthy master, to whom he was body-servant, and withwhom he toured the European nations as well as other foreign countries. Freed by the Civil war, the young negro made his way westward, and reached Montana by the steamor, Missouri River Red Cloud, leaving the boat at Fort Benton.

About 1389 he settled in Helena. where he lived in a small home near the scene of early day placer mining. He became well known to Helena residents as a cook for fishing and hunting parties, a gardener and houseman and a general handy man .. He also worked continually at gold washing, with cradle or pan, and eked out a comfortable livelihood for years. He was an unusually fine physical specimen of his race, standing well over six feet in height and possessed of great bodily strength. His manner was kind and dignified and his disposition cheerful. Until his last illness he walked erect and continued his work, despite his advancing years. A sister, living in Omaha, and a nephew residing in Butte-came to Helena for the funeral.
