FUNERAL SERVICES ARE HELD AT HELENA FOR FATHER McVEIGH

Helena, Feb. 24.—The funeral of the Rev. Patrick F. McVeigh, 40, who died suddenly February 20, of a heart ailment, took place yesterday, with services at St. Helena's cathedral and interment in Resurrection cemetery. Monsignor Victor Day, administrator of the Helena diocese, celebrated requiem high mass, assisted by members of the Catholic clergy of Butte and Helena. Pall bearers were associates of Father McVeigh on the faculty of Carroll college, and a guard of honor composed of members of the Knights of Columbus and of the Notre Dame club attended the casket during the time it lay in the cathedral.

Father McVeigh was born in Butte in 1893. Completing the course of study in the schools of that city, he entered Carroll, then Mount St. Charles college, the first student to register, and the only graduate of the class of 1916. He then attended St. Mary's seminary, in Cincinnati in preparation for the priesthood, and at the same time began graduate study in chemistry and other sciences at the Catholic university in Washington, D. C. He was ordained to the priesthood by the late Bishop John P. Carroll at the Church of the Sacred Heart in Butte in 1920. He became head of the science department of his alma mater and was head of the board of athletic control. Throughout his student days and until his untimely end he had been an active participant in all forms of athletics. From 1929 to 1931 Father McVeigh was given leave of absence to pursue advanced chemistry study at Notre Dame. In association with Dr. Nieuwland of the Dupont interests, he undertook research work in connection with the manufacture of synthetic rubber, as the result of which he was awarded the degree of Ph. D., in June, 1931.

Father McVeigh is survived by a sister, Mrs. William Steele, and by several nieces and nephews. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. James McVeigh, were old-time residents of Butte.
