YOUNG MAN SHOOTS ... SELF THROUGH HEAD

August Shikora, a well known young man of Libby, killed himself some time Tuesday evening by shooting timself through the head with a 38-55 rifle. His dead body was found Wednesday morning by his brother Paul lying in the woods on the north side of the Great Northern track, about 150 yards from the Grant Harley residence. The body had laid out; all night and was covered with snow. The young man was moved to commit the rash act because of disappointment in a love a fair with a Kalisnell young lady. This was indicated in a note which he left addressed ! to the young lady and in which he said he intended to take his life. ...

The young man had been at Kallanell since the first of the year, having returned to Libby last Monday Tuesday afternoon about 8 o'clock he took the rifle and told the family that he would go out for a little target practice. Upon his failure to return that evening, the family became uneasy and his brother Paul started to look for him. He followed the young : man's footprints in the snow until he reached the tracks where a freight had stood. Thinking that his brother had probably taken the freight to ... return to Kalispell, Paul: became so uneasy about his brother's absence that he decided to look further for him. He followed the tracks, finally saw where they had crossed the railroad and had gone into the woods through the deep snow. Rollowing these tracks, Paul came noon the

body of his brother covered by snow that had fallen during the night. Examination showed that he had shot himself through the head, the bullet entering directly above the right ear. There was one empty shell in the rifle. The body was wind about \$3.30. Wednesday morning.

Before leaving on his fatal errand August had written a letter to his brother, John in Kalispell, enclosing a note to a young lady there and asking John to deliver the note to her. The note stated the reason for the suicide.—Western News.
