David Johnson was born in Cambridge, Illinois, Feb. 22, 1863, and died at the Sisters' hospital Feb. 16, 1934, at the age of 70 years.

He received his early education at Cambridge. In his early childhood his father passed away, leaving him with an invalid mother, two sisters and two brothers. Later, after his mother's death, he and his sisters and brothers moved to a farm in Adair county, Iowa in the year 1882.

Mr. Johnson then retired from farming and made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Luther Logan.

Thirty years ago he joined the Modern Woodmen of Kalispell.

Last June he was called to Menlo, Iowa, by the death of his oldest brother, James. He leaves to mourn, a sister, Mrs. Margaret Case; a brother, Samuel Johnson, of Menlo, Iowa; two daughters, Mrs. Charles Miller and Mrs. Luther Logan; a son, James, and six grandchildren. Of these grandchildren, the eldest is Margaret Laird of Downingtown, Pa. There are also other relatives and a host of friends.

Leaving Great Falls, he entered government service in Seattle for one year, and in 1930 became an assistant in the office of chief clerk at Glacier Park headquarters at Belton, which position he was filling at the time of his untimely death.

On May 3, 1934, he was married to Helen Peterson of Kalispell. He died on August 20, at the age of 24 years, his death caused by accidental drowning.

Mr. Johnson was a young man of exemplary character. He was thrifty, careful and conscientious in his work. His social contacts were marked with courtesy, friendliness and willing service, and his friends were many.
