She gave instructions regarding financial matters, and told them to purchase certain cothing in one pavagraph she said: "I am taking little Pat with me. Bury her in mother's arms. I can't bear to leave her behind." It is said that the little girl was injured by an am tomobile recently, and it is probable that it was for this reason that she was at home.

Coroner Campbell found an empty box bearing a strychnine label in a garbage can in the rear of the Ferm well and is of the opinion that Mrs Hetzer administered the poison in oatmeal at breakfast this morning after the children had gone to school! The poison had been purchased a Broadwater's Saturday. She had been refused the poison once, but recturned later and another cierk gave her a small quantity, and recalls that she wanted more. ing as captain.

Mr. Hughes was educated in the public schools and at Drake Univer sity, from which instilution he gradnated in 1886. In the same year uated in 1888. In the same year, the married Fanny Scott, who survives him, as do two daughter. Mrs. Peart D. Prior and Mrs. Ruby Anderson, one son, James W., all residing at San Bernardino, Celifornia. and one sister, Mary 16. Hughes, re-siding at San Jose, in the same state.

Mr. Hughes engaged in farming for a period of years and then at Bethany, Missouri, entered the law offices at Hon. John M. Salee, one time attorney general or that state. It may be that the knowledge of the fact that he hore a name long faquality himself for membership in that honorable calling. He was admitted to the Missouri bar January 16, 1994, and practiced the law at Bethany, till 1913, when he estab-lished a law office at Polson, then in Finthead County. Late in the year 1914 he removed to Whitefish, where he continued to practice the profession of the law till September S. 1933, when stricken with the illness of which he died Fobruary 12, 1934.

Mr. Hughes was particularly a trial lawyer and peculiarly success-The extent of his practice is witnessed by the fact that on the records of this Court his name appears as attorney in 54 criminal cases, in 495 civil suits and 34 probate proededings. He also practiced exten-sively in Lincoln, Glacier, Toole and Pondera counties and in the United States District Court.

No greater commendation may be paid a man than can be paid to Mr. Hughes in that he was a good hus-hand and father. The remarkable band and father. faith and devotion hestowed upon-kim by wife and children is indis-putable proof that he merits this encomium.

The Court and the Bar extend to Mrs. Hughes, the daughters, the son and the sister hearifelt and sincere sympathy in their great bereuvement.
