**FUNERAL RITES HELD
AT HELENA FOR MRS.
EMMA GOZA HENSLEE**

(Special to Inter Lake)

Helena, Jan. 10.—Funeral services were held today at a mortuary chapel for Mrs. Emma Goza Henslee, 83, who died January 6, at the home of her nephew Sam Goza, after a brief illness. The Rev. S. D. Aubuchon, of the Baptist church officiated. The body was sent to Denver for interment.

Mrs. Henslee was born in Carroll Parish, Louisiana, in 1845. She was of French descent, her ancestors having been Huguenots who fled from France in the time of Louis XIV, prior to the revocation of the edict of Nantes which ended the persecution of Protestants on religious grounds.

With members of the Bartholomew Dupuys family, also Huguenots, the Goza family made their way to the American colonies, the Dupuys settling in Virginia and the Gozas in Louisiana. The family home was in Carroll parish for many generations. One of the treasured relics is a family Bible carried from France in the flight of the Huguenots. It is pierced by a bullet, fired in an attempt to stop the fleeing families and undoubtedly was the means of saving the life of the woman who had concealed it in her bosom. The bullet lodged upon the verse "This day the

Lord hath delivered us from the hands of our enemies."

The Goza family sent 1200 men to the Civil war as soldiers of the Confederacy. Emma Goza married John B. Henslee of Louisiana and the young couple left for the west, eventually settling in Leadville, Colorado in 1879. There Mrs. Henslee took a prominent part in the social and religious life of the frontier towns in which she spent the next 50 years. She was a lifelong member of the

Baptist church and organized Sunday school classes for the pioneer children of the mining camps.

Mrs. Henslee came to Helena several months ago, following the death of her sister, Mrs. E. P. Kribefflin in Sherman, Texas, where she had made her home since the death of Mr. Henslee in Denver some years ago.

Both of the venerable sisters were well known in Helena having visited at the home of Mr. Goza at frequent intervals.

KALISPELL WOMAN TAKES DAUGHTER ALONG TO DEATH

Presumably despondent because of the death of her husband, Mrs. Stella Hetzer today committed suicide by taking strychnine, and also took the life of her little daughter Pat.

The tragedy occurred at the Fernwell where the family had rooms and Coroner Campbell is of the opinion Mrs. Hetzer committed the rash act about 9 o'clock this morning. Beside Pat, Mrs. Hetzer had two other children, Howard 15, and Virginia 13, students in the Central school. When Howard returned home at noon he found the door locked, and summoned the landlady, who upon opening the door found the little girl, about 7, lying dead on the bed and the body of her mother nearby on the floor.

On a table was found a letter evidently addressed to the children in which she told them of what she intended to do. She gave instructions regarding financial matters, and told them to purchase certain clothing. In one paragraph she said: "I am taking little Pat with me. Bury her in mother's arms. I can't bear to leave her behind." It is said that the little girl was injured by an automobile recently, and it is probable that it was for this reason that she was at home.

Coroner Campbell found an empty box bearing a strychnine label in a garbage can in the rear of the Fernwell and is of the opinion that Mrs. Hetzer administered the poison in oatmeal at breakfast this morning after the children had gone to school. The poison had been purchased at Broadwater's Saturday. She had been refused the poison once, but returned later and another clerk gave her a small quantity, and recalls that she wanted more. Her husband,

Four children became the blessing of the home, two boys and two girls, all growing to manhood and womanhood, save one, who died in infancy.

On January 16, 1904, Mr. Hughes was admitted to the bar to practice law. In June, 1913, he was admitted to practice in the United States Supreme Court, at Helena, Montana. In the practice of law, with a wide experience, he had given the best of his life, some 30 years.

As a father and husband he was tender hearted. Lavishly he loved and supported his family.

In his early years he united with the Christian church to which he was a member at the time of his death, holding his membership in the First Christian church at Kalispell, Montana.

He was a member of the local Masonic lodge No. 64 of Whitefish.

His widow, Mrs. Fanny Hughes, one son, James W., two daughters, Mrs. Ruby Anderson, Mrs. E. L. Boyer, and two grand daughters, Frances Jane and Betty Lou, all of San Bernardino, California, and one sister, Miss Mary E. Hughes of San Jose, California, remain.

IN MEMORIAM

A memorial to the late A. L. Hughes, whose death occurred recently, was presented in district court at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon by a committee of the Bar Association, and was as follows:

The committee of the Northwestern Montana Bar Association appointed to submit an appropriate testimonial on the life and character of Alvin Lincoln Hughes, by a member of the Flathead County bar, report this memorial and recommend that it be spread upon the minutes of the Court and a copy certified by the Clerk be presented to the widow of Brother Hughes.

Alvin Lincoln Hughes was of Welsh extraction and was born on a farm near Ridgeway, in the State of Missouri, April 14, 1868. His parents were James and Mary Caroline Hughes. The father was in the Union Army in the Civil War, serving as captain.

Mr. Hughes was educated in the public schools and at Drake University, from which institution he graduated in 1886. In the same year he married Fanny Scott, who survives him, as do two daughters, Mrs. Pearl D. Prior and Mrs. Ruby Anderson, one son, James W., all residing at San Bernardino, California, and one sister, Mary E. Hughes, residing at San Jose, in the same state.

Mr. Hughes engaged in farming for a period of years and then at Bethany, Missouri, entered the law office of Hon. John M. Salee, one time attorney general of that state. It may be that the knowledge of the fact that he bore a name long famous at the bar prompted him to qualify himself for membership in that honorable calling. He was admitted to the Missouri bar January 16, 1904, and practiced the law at Bethany, till 1913, when he established a law office at Polson, then in Flathead County. Late in the year 1914 he removed to Whitefish, where he continued to practice the profession of the law till September 8, 1933, when stricken with the illness of which he died February 12, 1934.

Mr. Hughes was particularly a trial lawyer and peculiarly successful in the trial of cases to the jury. The extent of his practice is witnessed by the fact that on the records of this Court his name appears as attorney in 54 criminal cases, in 495 civil suits and 34 probate proceedings. He also practiced extensively in Lincoln, Glacier, Toole and Pondera counties and in the United States District Court.

No greater commendation may be paid a man than can be paid to Mr. Hughes in that he was a good husband and father. The remarkable faith and devotion bestowed upon him by wife and children is indisputable proof that he merits this eulogium.

The Court and the Bar extend to Mrs. Hughes, the daughters, the son and the sister heartfelt and sincere sympathy in their great bereavement.
