F. M. MORGAN

Mrs. Alberta Gardner received the news last week of the death of her father, F. M. Morgan, at Montrose, California, on May 26. The following biography has been prepared for friends of Mr. Morgan, who was a well-known pioneer of Kalispell.

Franklin Madison Morgan was born near Louisville, Kentucky, March 10, 1842. Early in life he became a carpenter, later becoming an architect. He followed the gold rush into Deadwood, South Dakota. Here he met and married Miss Ell Ladd of Manchester, New Hampshire. Soon after, they left Deadwood, and drove a covered wagon to Billings, Montana. Mr. Morgan built the first log cabin there. Later he built a cottage home, and went into the cattle-raising business in the Little Big Horn River country. They returned to Billings, where Mr. Morgan again went into the architectural business.

He built the first brick building in Billings, renting half the building to the first bank established there, using the other half as a building for an office of his own. He sold out his interests in Billings and went to Miles City for a short time. Later the Morgans located in Great Falls, where it was a two-day stage drive from Helena. He superintended the building of the first business buildings and homes there, maintaining an office with several draftsmen. Mrs. Morgan passed away in Great Falls, and was buried at Lawrence, Massachusetts. Later, Mr. Morgan married Cora Johnson Bolon.

In the spring of 1891, the family came to the town of Demersville, in Missoula county, where they lived until the town of Kalispell was established. He bought the first lots in the Kalispell township, three of them at First avenue east and First street, where he built the old West hotel; two lots on the corner of Main and Second streets, which he sold to the late W. N. Noffsinger. Later he built what is now the Fitch Drug store building. The remaining lot he bought in the original Kalispell was on First avenue west.

Somewhat later, he bought three lots on Sixth avenue east, building and making his home in what is now the W. B. McDonald residence. He also homesteaded a claim at Foy's lake. Because of ill health, he left the Flathead and located in Spokane; and again because of poor health he went to California after selling out his interests in the Flathead and Spokane. He made his home at Montrose, California, where he passed away May 26.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Cora Morgan, and a daughter of his first marriage, Mrs. Albert Gardner of Kalispell. Although 92 years of age when he died, Mr. Morgan's death came as a sudden shock, especially to the many early day Montanans, who will grieve at his passing.
